It was exciting to be a part of something that had so much to offer in a variety of areas and that opened up some new possibilities for doing ministry. It is exciting to think about the ways in which the Spirit might work through the various places of ministry that were represented at the conference. I look forward to sharing things I learned as the year unfolds before us. In the meantime, if you find the Spirit tugging at your heart when you think about equipping families in the raising of their children, please take a moment to talk to me. If you find the Spirit tugging at your heart in other ways, let me know that, too!

Be the one. That theme has stayed with me since my return. *Be the one.*

Be the one who seeks to make an impact. *Be the one* who realizes anew the gifts and talents that God is calling you to use. *Be the one* who makes a difference in your church, your neighborhood, your workplace. *Be the one* who prayerfully considers the ways in which God wants to use you. *Be the one* who steps forward in faith to face the unknown. *Be the one* who offers a word of encouragement and builds someone else up. And *be that one* together with others.

God’s call to us began at our baptism and continues throughout our life in community. How is God calling you to respond? How will you *be the one*?

"Why, I remember the year when we had so much snow....." "Remember all that rain we had in '93?" "I don't think it could have been much hotter in '36?" When I was growing up I can remember hearing my parents and grandparents talk about how hot certain summers were or how much snow and cold there had been during the winters. Or it might be the times that huge amounts of rain forced streams, creeks and rivers out their banks and flooded farm fields. Here in Iowa we all remember the times that the Des Moines River and Raccoon Rivers have overflowed their banks as they flow to the Mississippi River. I think I'm beginning to sound more like those relatives and my parents. This winter definitely reminds us of those with copious amounts of snow as I was growing up in SE Iowa. I don't remember many times that our little one-room country school was cancelled for snow, but I do remember the building of tunnels in the snow-filled ditches or creating "Fox and Goose" mazes in the snow. What are your gifts?

For many, giving is associated with money. Giving includes money, but, as faithful givers, we first give ourselves, and the giving of our gifts and resources will follow (2 Corinthians 8:5). We all have different gifts and blessings to share. God has blessed us with gifts of wood-working, sewing, serving, teaching, singing, gardening, leading, cleaning, etc. Whatever our skills or gifts, we can use and give them to extend the kingdom and help others. Through faith, we are compelled to give because we know that God is the source of all of our blessings (2 Corinthians 5:14). Giving expresses our gratitude to God for what He has given to us.

In the third chapter of Acts, we find a lame beggar at the temple in Jerusalem, pleading with people to give him money. Peter and John were entering the temple, and they heard the beggar’s plea for help.

**Minutes
Council Meeting, January 10, 2010
Grace Lutheran Church**

The meeting was called to order by President Dan Warren. Council members present included Jeff Farrell, Mary Helt, MeLissa Lawson, Kristin Medhurst, Carla Peterman, Denny Rehder, Jon Rissman, Tom Selander, Rich Snyder and Deanna Weber. Joyce Lewis was absent.

The minutes of the December 29th meeting were approved.

Dan reported that Pastor Johnson has accepted the offer to become our interim minister and is consulting his tax advisor before signing the acceptance papers. It is hoped he will join us in late January.

Budget issues dominated the remainder of the meeting. Considerable discussion revolved around means by which the 2010 budget can be reasonably balanced. Four actions were taken with formal votes:

1 – Reduce the utilities budget (gas and electric) to a 7.5% increase over 2009 actual.

2 – Transfer \$5,000 from equity into the budget.

3 – Reduce our expected benevolence by \$23,149 with the stipulation that increased income during 2010 will be added to benevolence until it reaches 12% of actual income.

4 – The Esperanza budget will be set at the funds remaining in the Multi-Cultural Reserve with that amount added to the income side of the ledger.

A motion to adjourn was accepted and the meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.

NEW IN THE CHURCH LIBRARY...



Christmas Bus – by Melody Carlson – A fictional story of a lonely woman in a quiet little town who opens her home at Christmas to surprising and unusual guests.

The First Christmas – by Marcus Borg and John Crossan – The authors explore the beginning of the life of Christ to show that the Christmas story is far richer and more challenging than people imagine.

The Help – by Kathryn Stockett – This is the fictional story of three extraordinary women whose determination to start a movement of their own forever changes a town.

The Last Lecture – by Randy Pausch – Randy, a computer science professor at Carnegie Mellon was asked to give a lecture concerning his demise and to speak about what he would want to impart to the

world if he knew it was his last chance. He didn't have to imagine it as his last, since he had recently been diagnosed with terminal cancer.

The Legend of the Three Trees – Book Adaptation by Catherine McCafferty – This children's classic folk tale helps each of us understand that God's dreams for us can be even bigger than those we dare to dream for ourselves.

Life Among the Lutherans – Garrison Keillor – Based on Keillor's Lake Wobegon monologues, this is a collection of stories about the struggles of ordinary people in an imperfect world, the life and work of the pastor who leads them and the church to whose high standards they aspire in the small town they call home.

Someone Knows My Name – by Lawrence Hill – This is a fictional story of Aminata Diallo, kidnapped from Africa as a child, is enslaved in South Carolina but escapes during the chaos of the Revolutionary War. She becomes a scribe for the British, earns her freedom, and follows her heart back to Africa. It is an impressive historical work telling of the injustices of slavery.

The Year of Living Biblically – by A. J. Jacobs – Jacobs decides to attempt to obey the Bible as literally as possible for one full year. The resulting spiritual journey is funny, profound, reverent and irreverent, personal and universal.

Parenting Adolescent Children Resource Is Currently Available in Church Library

The workshop includes a workbook along with a DVD which now is available to our members in the church library.
