GOD'S GREAT SURPRISE

It was 6AM Easter Sunday, my first Easter in a new parish, and I was trying to prepare myself for the five services at which I would preach between 6:30 am and 1 in the afternoon. As I approached my office I saw an Easter basket leaning against the door. To be honest, I'm not much for Easter baskets, fake grass, solid sugar chicks or chocolate bunnies. BUT I do like cards and there was one attached. Inside was a delightful note of kind words and the promise that her prayers would be with me through the day. It was signed, "Grandma", which would be wonderful ... except both my grandmothers had been dead for over 48 years!

I would not find out till months later that I had been "adopted" by an elderly woman in the congregation who, somehow discovering that I had no grandmothers, decided to be mine! She continues in that role.

God is like that. Just when we are sure that death wins all the time, God comes with a surprise. When we are sure that it will only get darker, the sun/SON rises. When we are sure that cemeteries are destination points, we are led (though not without pain) into new beginnings. Just when I'm sure I'll never get to hug 'my' grandma, one appears to offer a hug at the door most every Sunday for 10 years.

It sounds like Easter to me, but perhaps we've celebrated it so many times we've lost the ability to be surprised, to be blessed. Or maybe the earth-shaking reality of that first Easter gets lost in the sugary chicks, chocolate bunnies and fake grass. Perhaps the power of the Easter message is over.

It was the week after Easter and the family was traveling together. In the parents' conversation was heard the line, "Well, now that Easter's over ...". A small, but very sure voice responded, "But Easter's never over!" Not as long as 'grandmas' hug and little ones share faith, the church sings loudly and responds with desperate hope to the claim, "Christ is Risen!" HE IS RISEN INDEED!



The Reformation of Image by Joseph Leo Koerner – The author is a professor of history of art and architecture at Harvard University. He is the nephew of church member Pat Bordt. Stewardship Corner (from "Steward Builders," a year-round stewardship publication)

A Sure and Certain Hope

Hebrews 11 begins with very familiar words: *“Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see”* (Hebrews 11:1). The rest of the chapter is devoted to those whom we call “heroes of faith.” We read about Abel and his sincere sacrifice, Enoch who pleased God, Noah who built an ark, Abraham who followed God to a place he didn’t know, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, even Rahab, the prostitute, along with judges, kings, and prophets of God’s people – all servants of God who, through faith, pleased him with their acts of obedience. *“The world was not worthy of them”* (Hebrews 11:38), the writer concludes.

“None of them received what had been promised” (verse 39), but they believed. They were sure of what they hoped for and certain of what they could not see. We, too live by faith. We didn’t see Jesus on the cross; we didn’t see his risen body; we didn’t watch him ascend into the clouds, but we, too, are sure of what we hope for and certain of what we cannot see. We have an advantage, though. We are on the other side of Calvary. We have the Word of God, given us through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, written by those who were in Gethsemane, those who did stand at the foot of the cross, those who did run to find the tomb empty, those who did touch his hands and sides, those who did stand staring into the heavens when Christ ascended.

Those eyewitnesses turned the world upside down, because they themselves had been turned upside down. Those who had deserted him (Mark 14:50), denied him (Mark 14:66-72), and hid themselves away in a locked room in fear (John 20:19) were transformed by the living Christ. They came out of the room, they declared themselves his followers and servants, and they found they could not *“help speaking about what [they] had seen and heard”* (Acts 4:20).


And that’s how we know. We have hope built on faith passed on to us by God’s people through the power of God’s Spirit. And that’s how others will know – by our *“speaking about what we [have] seen and heard.”* This is our awesome and joyous privilege and responsibility as God’s stewards.

Remembering Good Friday

Easter is right around the corner, but, without Good Friday, there would be no Easter. Look, then, on the suffering servant. Hear again the story of his Passion. Think anew of the ridicule and physical torment he endured even before his walk to Golgotha. Ponder his last words from the cross on which he hung in agony: *“It is finished.” With that, he bowed his head and gave up his spirit* (John 19:30). Focusing on this event in history reminds us again of the great cost Jesus paid for our salvation and leads us to worship and praise him with all we are and have.

Prayer: Lord, I am blessed through the blood that Jesus shed on the cross of Calvary. You have forgiven all my sin. You have removed from me and forgotten all that separated me from you. I thank you for the peace and joy that come from being in you. Grant me the confidence and the passion to proclaim boldly the Gospel to all people. In Christ’s name I pray. Amen.

Music Notes.....

What does an organ selection, hymn, or anthem contain that gets it “selected” to be used during a certain worship service? I bet that is a question you sometimes ask yourself as you leave the sanctuary or service. Just what was that crazy music director thinking in a certain music selection? The first thing is how it fits with the text of the sermon. The text is brought in, suggested hymns are perused, and a sketch is made. The anthem is inserted. If it is a choral piece for the week, we discuss where it might need to be placed in the service. While there is a “set pattern” for the service, there are times we need to move parts to enhance the worship service. I try to select communion hymns that people KNOW so that they may sing as they come forward to receive the elements. I hope people come to the table with joy in their hearts and a song on their lips. The organ music is selected to fit the season or mood the service. There are many wonderful selections by “proven” and new composers. The Brass, Bells and Youth Choir are all inserted to help enhance a specific service.

Hymn selection is the most interesting. There are many fine hymns in this hymnal. I remember several years ago that the Methodist Church unveiled a new hymnal with NEW hymns. It was shortly after the merger of the Evangelical United Brethren and the United Methodist Church. That doesn’t always set well with members of congregations. Then came a “supplement” that included some hymns that were omitted, or old tunes/new words, or made non-gender. (Sound familiar?) We try to use a variety hymns to enhance the scripture and sermon. Sometimes there are favorite words set to a different tune. (For me, “Love Divine” goes to a tune not in the ELW. It does take some rethinking!)

As you read this edition, Pastor Tim and I will be putting the final touches on all the services for Holy Week and Easter. Please check the schedule for these services. Each service is given careful consideration to its content, text and music used. The Brass, Bells, and Chancel Choir, each have been working diligently on music for each of these services.

On February 28th, the Grand View Collge Choir presented several selections for our worship service. In my limited historical knowledge of Grace, I believe this was the first time they had been here. I am certainly glad that they finally came to us. This congregation was so supportive of these musicians. Thank you for your generosity through the free-will offering. It will help them offset some of their cost. Their home concert will be held March 28th at Luther Memorial Church beginning at 3:00 PM. Besides the selections they sang at Grace, there will be many other compositions. A highlight will be Benjamin Britten’s *Rejoice in the Lamb*. I remember singing this on my sophomore choir tour. It is a highly emotional work that I hope many can experience. The Luther College Orchestra will be in concert at Faith Lutheran Church on March 26th at 7:30 PM. A free-will offering will be taken following the concert. At least 3 congregation members of Grace are alumni of the Luther Orchestra organizations; Matt Jordahl, Kristen Snyder, and Tyler Reihmann.

I want to leave you with a hymn with very powerful words that I recently used for a funeral. I have included the first and third verses for you to read. They were written by Natalie Sleeth. May you have a happy Easter.

In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree; In cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free! In the cold and snow of winter there’s a spring that waits to be, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

In our end is our beginning; in our time, infinity; In our doubt there is believing; in our life, eternity, In our death, a resurrection; at the last, a victory, Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

As always, it is a pleasure to serve the people of Grace. See you in church.

Unfinished Business

- Listed in the budget under "Multicultural Ministry" is \$5,549 to be used for programming expenses and director salary for Esperanza.
- Gary will attend Finance Committee meetings as council liaison.
- Mary presented a form to be given to the Columbarium Committee which elicits information regarding their operations.
- Kathy will be responsible for council notes to be published in the "Friendly Visitor" in an effort to keep the congregation updated on our happenings and decisions.
- Joyce volunteered to be the council liaison to the Stewardship Committee.
- Dan identified other congregations that engage in campus ministry in the Drake vicinity in the event that we elect to transfer our "Campus Ministry" funds.
- Julie volunteered to be the council liaison to the Lay Ministry Team.
- Joyce will contact Personnel Committee to get the group up and running. The By-Laws defined the composition of the committee.

New Business

- As the first step in ascertaining an accurate roll, Jackie will supply us with a list of people who have not communed or contributed in the last 2 years.
- Rich graciously volunteered to read over the Constitution and Bylaws to help us reconcile accounts and determine: 1) where we are, 2) where we are supposed to be, and 3) how we will get there.
- The Gift and Memorial Policy at Grace states that all gifts and memorials are to be recorded in the Memorial Book and not memorialized with a plaque.

Council Notes

The Grace Council has met once monthly and attended a weekend retreat. We are prayerfully considering our next steps as a changing Christian community. As we listen to our members of the congregation and to God, we will determine our mission.

We have serious problems. We have a budget crisis due to the current financial situation in general, a loss of members, and a lack of income. We have gone from two to one pastor and probably will not return to two pastors in the near future. Finally, we need to define ourselves in light of who we are now and our responsibilities to nurture and serve our members according to God's plan for us.

Meetings have been held to re-define La Voz de la Esperanza. This month a report will be delivered to the Council and we will be communicating additional information to the congregation as it is known. The bilingual service is a joyful experiment to see how it feels and works for us. We celebrate the Grace of our Lord together!

We may have to consider continued cuts in our budgets for every church organization. Consider how to handle a possible ten percent cut, if needed in our June adjusted budget.



Endowment Fund

The Grace Endowment Fund was established in 1992 with \$1,000.00 voted by the Church Council. Since 1997 when the first funds were awarded a total of \$215,620.68 has been distributed to various projects. This includes \$17,913.00 that was awarded on March 4, 2010 to eleven different projects by the Endowment Committee. These projects will not only benefit the community of Grace but will extend Grace's witness to the Des Moines community, the Christian community and two areas in Africa.

1. \$1,300 to the Grace Education Committee for the painting of murals in the Sunday School area of the church.
2. \$1,240 to La Voz de Esperanza to purchase Rosetta Stone English Language teaching materials and computers for the purpose of teaching English to members of Esperanza.
3. \$550 to the Grace Education Committee to purchase 25 New Revised Standard Version Student Study Bibles to be used by Grace Confirmation students.
4. \$500 to the Grace Garden Club for plantings to enhance the Grace signs on Urbandale Avenue.
5. \$250 to the Grace Education Committee for the Sunday School vegetable garden. To purchase a rain barrel, compost, fencing, seeds and plants.
6. \$950 to the Grace Education Committee to be applied to expenses for the Vacation Bible School afternoon program.
7. \$3,075 to Lutheran Lakeside Camp to purchase fifty new mattresses and complete their mattress replacement project.
8. \$2,400 to Medicine for Mali to provide scholarships for eight girls to attend high school. Medicine for Mali has begun tutoring with an emphasis on girls. Educating females will benefit generations to come.
9. \$4,500 to Lutheran Services in Iowa for the Refugee Emergency Fund to help extend services for six months of rental assistance and bus tokens.
10. \$1,815 to Mosaic to purchase a specialized wheelchair for a young man with Spina Bifida.
11. \$1,333 to Family AIDS Care and Education Services (FACES) to build a patient waiting bay at one of FACES supported health facilities in Kenya. FACES mission is to provide high-quality, comprehensive and accessible HIV prevention, care and treatment for individuals and families in Kenya.

Continued support of the Grace Endowment Fund through gifts and bequests will secure the growth of the fund and this outreach ministry of Grace Lutheran Church.

He reconciled us back to God


