Keep us, O Lord, so awake in the duties of our callings that we may sleep in your peace and wake in your glory to an unending possession of that realm which your Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, has purchased for us with the price of his own blood."

Debt Reduction Campaign

The results of the Debt Reduction Campaign were very gratifying. We thank all members for their generosity. We know that many members were also very generous in the initial building campaign. We believe our ministry here at Grace is very blessed to have such a strong sense of stewardship within our members. A total of \$88,460 was raised. These funds have been used to pay down the principal on the mortgage with the bank. This pay down, combined with the recent reset of the interest rate, will allow for the retirement of the debt on an accelerated basis. Again, we **thank you** for your generosity.

Finance Report – September Results

Financial results for September YTD are as follows:

- Offerings – Actual \$324,361, Budget \$343,643
- Other Income – Actual \$10,830, Budget \$11,984
- Expenses – Actual \$338,994, Budget \$360,242
- Net activity – Actual (\$3,804), Budget (\$4,615)

Actual net activity was comparable to budget due to two offsetting variances:

1. Pledged, Unpledged and Easter offerings are below budget by approximately \$20,000, the majority of which is pledged offerings. The concern is if the offering decline will be a continuing trend or due to payment timing.
2. Expense activity is also below budget by approximately \$21,000. This variance was the result of certain expense activity that was budgeted but the actual expense has yet to occur. However, the largest portion of the variance was due to lack of the Music Director position for a portion of the year, which is known to be a single year item and will not reoccur in 2013.

The Finance Committee will continue to review the current and future financial position of the Church throughout the budget process.

Pastor Mike led devotions, asking not what we expect to get out of church, but what we have to *offer* God.

Meeting was called to order.

Agenda was approved as printed.

Minutes from the August meeting were approved as printed.

Written reports, including the financials, were accepted as submitted. During Pastor Mike's verbal report, he highlighted the need for more community- and fellowship-building activities at Grace.

Old business

Open appointed Council position – invited candidate declined.

First Circle Friends – Julie Honsey and Pastor Mike provided an update. We have 13 volunteers trained, including lead volunteers who have planned activities for each month. Although we anticipated starting the program October 4, it will likely be delayed because LSI has not signed up any participants yet.

New business

Standing committee reports – none required action. There was discussion about whether a line item for the Companion Congregation Committee should be brought into the annual budget. Currently the committee holds a reserve account that carries over from year to year. Money is raised through fundraisers and Endowment grants. It was agreed that any change would require further discussion.

On behalf of the confirmation class, Julie Honsey requested permission to conduct a fundraising effort for the annual DMARC Hunger Hike. Our youth will solicit contributions between services the next two Sundays and participate in the Hunger Hike on October 14. The confirmation class has a service project every month. The request was approved.

Potential council members – Rich Snyder is seeking names of potential candidates to fill the two vacant positions plus up to four positions that may be open as council members complete their terms.

It was moved, seconded, and passed that the council move into Executive Session at 7:55 p.m.

Executive Session was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

The council authorized the payment of back sales taxes on independent custodial services for the 2012 calendar year and authorized the financial secretary to amend the budget to reflect payments due.

The council authorized John Roehrick and Pastor Mike to negotiate with the Iowa Department of Revenue on the resolution of any other back sales taxes owed on independent custodial services for prior years.

Announcements

Standing committee reports – Kathy Bowermaster reported that efforts are underway to update the communications for members of Grace and the community at large through revisions to the website and a new email newsletter. Suggestions are welcome.

The Lay Ministry Team is reviewing the notes from last spring's Cottage Meetings and determining how to disseminate them to appropriate committees and possibly incorporate some of the suggestions for new projects.

The ad hoc committee on a staff position for Youth has been restarted, with an emphasis on visioning. Ellen Wonderlin has volunteered to lead the Youth Director Visionary Committee.

Photo directory – Volunteers have been recruited to handle this project.

Photo wall project – A design has been developed, materials have been purchased, and installation is planned for this fall.

Thursday worship services will begin October 25. Sherry Kocek, Ensemble Director, is coordinating musicians and other worship assistants. Come and bring a friend!

The meeting was adjourned at 9 p.m. The next meeting will be held October 23.

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor"

(Luke 4:18)

Those are the words from Isaiah that Jesus reads when he stands up in the synagogue in Nazareth. They mark the beginning of his ministry in Luke. And those words clearly speak to what Jesus was sent to do. What if, however, we read them in a different light? What if we read them as if the Spirit is speaking to us individually and to our mission as the church today? What if we really take those words to heart?

The ELCA Malaria Campaign is doing just that. Together with governments, international organizations, businesses, and religious, community and health organizations, the ELCA has established a goal to help end deaths from malaria. This completely preventable and treatable disease does not have to have the final word, and in fact, in several places around the world, it already doesn't. Read this ELCA news release, dated September 24, 2012, about the work that is happening in Zambia:

CHICAGO (ELCA) - Ackson Chisaka, a Lutheran pastor in Zambia, is witnessing first hand how education about malaria, prevention and treatment of the disease is making a life-saving impact. Enoch Shidola, a clinical officer at a health center in the same town where Chisaka serves, agrees and went so far as to report that, by a conservative estimate, malaria cases in Kashima, in Zambia's Mufumbwe northwestern region, have been reduced to half. ... In early 2012, more than 4,670 people in Zambia took part in "awareness sessions" designed to stress the importance of malaria testing and understand clinical treatment options, ... and more than 1,160 rapid diagnostic tests were distributed. More than 2,030 people with malarial symptoms were tested in several open clinics in the northwestern part of Zambia.

"The statistics [of malaria] are compelling, even more so when we realize that each awareness session, each rapid diagnostic kit, each dose of malaria medication represents entire lives that have been changed and enriched by the work of the ELCA Malaria Campaign," said Jessica Nipp Hacker, coordinator of the ELCA Malaria Campaign.

Here at Grace some groups and committees are already beginning to talk about what we can do, and we will be forming a task force to create an awareness and fundraising campaign as well. Stay tuned for more information in the coming months. In the meantime, check out www.elca.org/malaria.

From runaway to a college scholarship

Like millions of teenagers before her, Misha is putting her bedroom in boxes and soon she'll unpack them in a college dorm room, her whole future unfolding before her. It's a rite of passage that almost didn't happen.

Less than a year ago, Misha was in a crisis shelter, a high school runaway who had just been picked up by police. Her senior year had spiraled out of control. Her mom, Barb, was furious with her behavior. Her dad, Jack, was struggling to stay sober. Her boyfriend, a 21-year-old with two kids, was draining her confidence and her college savings account.

"He wanted to control her," said Barb of Misha's boyfriend. "He pressured her to quit softball, to quit high school. He took her money."

It was that day that Deb, an LSI caseworker, walked through the shelter door.

Misha's mom Barb contacted LSI's Brief Intensive Services program, seeking help. The program fills the gap for families who do not qualify for traditional state services, but need support during a crisis.

"Misha wasn't receptive at first to services, but Deb built a relationship with her," Barb said.

And slowly, Barb realized the program could help not just Misha, but their whole family.



The garden has been cleared, and unless it snows, it will be tilled by early November. Thanks to Ray Meylor of Pheasants Forever, the garden will also be planted with Annual Rye as a winter cover crop. While the rye may not have long to grow, a cover crop can provide many advantages including: extensive root systems that aerate and allow water to reach greater soil depths and keep heavy snows and spring rains from compacting the soil; erosion control, weed control, and the addition of organic matter when tilled under in Spring. Look for seed ordering information and planting dates in early 2013!

Mexico immersion Trip


