Needs Replenished

Like many of you, the story of "Iowa Legend: Carson King" has been on my mind a lot lately. As thousands gathered to see College Gameday in action, this seemingly average person stands up with a sign requesting "beer money." What started off as an attempt to get on television turned into something that has brought together people on both sides of the rivalry together for a great cause. What we've come to learn about Carson King is that he is not average all, but extraordinary. A legend.

As the story has unfolded, Carson has been forced to deal with a variety of pressures. He has dealt with rocketing into local celebrity status. He has dealt with national fame. He has had to deal with his past. Through it all he has never waivered on his commitment to a need that is far greater than his own needs. When confronted with statements from his past, he dealt with them with refreshing honesty that has been long gone from public discourse with celebrities and politicians. Carson has changed a lot in the last 8 years, and that is a good thing. Iowa is in love with the man that he has become.

This seemingly average guy has united people in a cause that has now raised over a million dollars for the University of Iowa Stead Family Children's Hospital. He didn't raise the money, or sell things, of go door to door. It was organic and involved numerous people joining the cause. Gifts range from very small to very large, yet when pooled together, this young man started something that none of us will ever forget.

The story is more than simply a current event. It speaks to the life of a congregation as well. The story of nearly every congregation begins with a person or small group of people wondering if this might work. The Holy Spirit takes it from there and in much the same way, suddenly there are people around and a tangible sense of energy. Throughout the life of the congregation there is an unwavering focus on something far greater than the needs of the community of faith.

We also must face our past sometimes. It is said that if you are the same person at 40 years old as you were at 20 years old, you just wasted 20 years. My experience is that if a congregation is the same as it was 20 years ago, we have wasted 20 years too. Things have changed. Grace Lutheran Church has changed a lot in the last 20 years, as has the complete context of Church in North America. There are parts of those changes that bring about a variety of emotions, and that is ok. We simply need to take time to address those realities.

DMARC and Little Free Pantry October Drive Disposable Hygiene Products

We often think of donating food to DMARC and food pantries, but did you know they collect and distribute other goods? DMARC has a great need for disposable hygiene products, like diapers and tampons and pads. Also, as a part of our Grace Little Free Pantry we intend

to have a cabinet devoted to just hygiene products. In the Preparation phase of our October Service Learning theme "Stewardship of Money" we are going to spend some time learning and thinking about the cost of these necessary items and how that might impact a person's ability to afford other things, like food or utilities.

As part of our Action phase from October 6 to October 20 we are going to do a congregation-wide drive for diapers, tampons and pads. Your family can do the work of deciding how best to share your money in this effort; buying the items or giving your money to DMARC so they can buy in bulk. Take some time as a family to talk about cost per item and how many of each item a person might need each day or week. Do the math, figure out what a monthly budget might be and if that is for the generic or the name brand. Then, holding that information in mind, discern what you might be able to share. Some of the money and items donated will go to DMARC and some will stay here to fill our Grace Little Food Pantry hygiene cabinet. Some statistical information from DMARC to aid in your discernment:

Diapers

- Diapers are a huge cost for low-income families. On average, a family has to spend \$18 a week (or \$936 a year) per child, which represents six percent of a single mother's gross pay from a full-time minimum wage job (and that figure doesn't take into account the cost of wipes).
- 16% of Iowa children under the age of 18 are infants and toddlers; 20% of those children live in families earning less than 100% of the FPL (Federal Poverty Level) and 22% percent live in families earning 100%-200% of FPL

Tampons and Pads

- 1 in 4 menstruating people struggle to purchase period products due to lack in income
- Menstruating people require an average of 6 period products per day
- State and federal safety-net programs cannot be used to purchase period supplies
- 1 in 5 low-income menstruating people report missing work, school, or other obligations due to lack of access to period supplies

Little Free Pantry (LFP) Update

Last month we told you a Pergola would be built – unfortunately the next permit approval meeting for such a structure is October 23. As we are good neighbors, the lovely Pergola will wait for placement approval, and then will be placed in an appropriate spot, possibly next Spring. However, the cabinets (as illustrated below) of the LFP WILL be installed on a smaller stand at the East end of the building, close to the garden. Confirmation students have painted the outside, and it will have a roof and a metal printed sign with our logo and the words "Little Free Pantry". There are three cabinets on each side with clear

doors, for a total of 6 cabinet spaces.

Between the DMARC Drive above, and a Thrivent Action Event, we will fill the pantry to start. It is our hope that the congregation and neighborhood will purchase various items to stock the LFP. The LFP has been constructed to be watertight, so anyone can walk up to place items in or take items out.



Church Council Highlights From the August 27th, 2019 Council Meeting

At the August 27th, 2019 Church Council Meeting:

• Staff and Financial Reports:

- The Council reviewed the monthly Staff reports.
- Staff is revising the Facilities Use Policy.
- Church and Grace Kids Care financial reports were reviewed and discussed. Daycare finances continue to be in the black. Church giving is ahead of budget, however some large unexpected expenses have placed us in a deficit position.
- The Council further discussed security issues and some possible solutions.
- The Council received and reviewed Pastor Mike's Sabbatical Report, which contained some stories about churches visited, discussion of common problems facing most churches today, and some ideas gleaned from the whole sabbatical process.

Capital Campaign

- The Council received and discussed printed material from another church's capital campaign.
- Brad Lint volunteered to serve on the Capital Campaign Committee.
- After discussion, the Council approved formation of an Oversight Committee to work with the Capital Campaign Committee.

• Other reports, new business

- Tammy Denton brought up the need for a pamphlet or printed guide of some sort which could be handed out to groups using the facility. The guides would contain information such as the location of light switches, location of restrooms, emergency exits and instructions, and so forth.
- The next Council meeting will be September 24th, 2019, 6 PM, in Grace Hall.

Active Grace October Schedule - Stewardship of Resources

We will continue our Fall Active Grace theme of Stewardship into the month of October by focusing on Stewardship of Money and Time. If we believe that all things are a gift from God then it is important to talk about the best way to enjoy and share those gifts. One gift that we often shy away from naming with young people is the gift of money. As a part of our congregational stewardship campaign it is important that we name the needs and model giving and generosity for our children. You may think, "kids don't have money'. Many get an allowance or the gift of money for a birthday and have to decide what they will do with that money. The habits of saving and spending begin at a young age and as a church that believes in good stewardship of gifts we need to have those conversations with young people.

Here are some ways we intend to do that this month-

On October 6 we have invited R.J. Rademacher from Thrivent Financial to come lead Active Grace participants through a workshop called "More Than Money Matters" that is meant to help families talk about how to decide what they give, spend and save.

October 13 and 20 Confirmation students are leading an effort to collect relief funds for Hurricane Dorian victims through Lutheran Disaster Response.

October 20 Active Grace families will engage in service with our Grace Little Food Pantry and DMARC, talking specifically about the impact the cost of living impacts a family's ability to afford necessities like food and hygiene products.

"Thank You, God"

Every week, when 8-year-old Chase met with LSI's Pastor Dennis Bauer, he would ask to pray for "the same old thing: to find a good, loving forever family."

Chase is in third grade. But in his young life, he has already experienced trauma most of us cannot fathom. When Chase was 6, he was removed from his home and his mother's parental rights were terminated. He felt confused, terrified, and shocked. Chase struggled to cope with his anger and emotions. He acted out and became physically aggressive. Chase needed help, and LSI's Beloit Residential Treatment Center in Ames offered that help.

After arriving at Beloit, Chase quickly became involved in LSI's voluntary Spiritual Life program, where he participates in faith-based activities like art and music. Through regular meetings with Pastor Dennis, Chase says he is focusing on his faith and "trusting in God and saying prayers."

Outside of Spiritual Life, Chase is also learning healthy skills through group therapy to help him cope on the difficult days.

Now, Chase is thriving. His confidence is building every day, and he has big plans for his future. He wants to be a surgeon when he grows up, and he dreams of learning to bake and do woodworking. And the immediate future is looking pretty bright, too: Chase is in the process of being adopted.

During a recent visit with Pastor Dennis, Chase prayed a different prayer: "Thank you, God, for giving me a family."
