Clarification regarding the Summer Book Club, Black Lives Matter and the church street sign

In the October 2020 Friendly Visitor, an article on page 7 detailed that a group of Grace members had been discussing the book "Dear Church: A Love Letter to America's Whitest Denomination" by Lenny Duncan, and that the group had come to agree on three points of action in the weeks and months to come. One of these points was:

"Our electronic sign will include "Black Live Matter" in the regular rotation and include a passage of scripture that references the call that Christians have in this movement, beginning with Luke 15. "

There have been a few questions about this, and Grace staff want to clear up any confusion. While the book study and its continuing form – a multigenerational study group of Grace members, including some staff – discussed and proposed this idea, they did not dictate what goes on the sign.

Items posted on our street sign are meant to be welcoming, inspirational, honor others, or promote Grace, Grace Kids Care, the Little Free Library and Pantries, and our neighborhood. This particular idea, however, was discussed by staff, slept on, thought about, and discussed more before approving. Approval was then requested from the Grace Executive Committee.

What we believe at Grace, and in the ELCA, is that Black lives DO matter. We have updated the sign to include the words "We believe that" in front of Black lives matter, along with a scripture reference. Each week or so the sign will change to include a different passage of scripture.

Staff are reading and discussing the displayed scriptures in staff meeting. We invite you to study those along with us, and as such, will publish those in each week's enews and announcements going forward. The first posted passage was Luke 15, and the current posted is Psalm 146. The next will be Isaiah 58.

Food Insecurity in our Neighborhood

Last year as a part of Active Grace Sunday School we learned about food insecurity and the ways that individuals and families may lack access to food. Our Little Free Pantry is an effort to fill in gaps that people in our neighborhood may have in their food budget. We have found that this need is great as we notice how quickly the shelves of our pantry are cleared. Littlefreepantry.org has this statistic on their homepage -



"food insecurity has skyrocketed from 8.4% of households, to 16.6% of households as of July 2020". As we move into the winter, and continue to live within the constraints of the pandemic, here are some things to consider for keeping our pantry stocked-

- 1. Buy (and encourage others to buy) duplicates of whatever you already buy. If you eat/use it, so will someone else. Further, grocery shopping is a habitual activity. If to get "the right thing" we must go down an aisle we don't usually shop, we probably won't.
- 2. If you experience sticker shock when browsing an item, it should go inside! Diapers, feminine hygiene products, canned protein...these things are expensive and important.

Please choose items in plastic not glass during the cold months. Boxed meals, like Tuna Helpers or Campbell's Ready Meals are always a need and an easy thing for people to grab and use. Snacks for after school are always a good idea, too. Find a list of other Winter items in this newsletter.

If you are not able to get here to stock the pantry, consider using a grocery delivery service to purchase items and send them to the church and we will happily stock them for you. Be sure you contact the office before doing this so we can be sure someone is here to receive delivery.

This is a way that we can be the church in this community even though we cannot gather in person. Let's keep this pantry stocked this winter!

Diving into this beautiful chapter, one can almost hear a tenor voice breaking into the chaos of the world around us with the start of that recitative from Handel's *Messiah* "Comfort ye." On days like this, in months like this, in a year like this, I need to hear these words, and I am pretty sure that you do too.

This year feels like a "Biblical year" where the history books will say that the very earth trembled and shook. It will speak of nations in a panic. It will speak of a pandemic loosed in the world. It will speak of the tremendous loss that was felt. To date, there are more than 1,500 lowans that have died of Covid-19, with over 215,000 others from around the United States, combined with more than 900,000 others from around the world.

This year has us all tired and a little beat up, and it is alright to admit that. If you haven't admitted that, even to yourself, start there. It is OK. We are all in need of these words from the prophet Isaiah, words that speak both comfort and resilience. We need that gentle whisper of God to comfort us. We also need that reassurance that although we are tired, we will find our strength renewed. Again, it is OK. You are not going about this alone. God is with you. We are in this together. "Comfort, O Comfort my people." Lean into the knowledge that God goes with you. Even though apart physically, know that we journey through this world together.

Health and Safety Update

"Every time I say your name in prayer—which is practically all the time—I thank God for you, the God I worship with my whole life in the tradition of my ancestors. I miss you a lot, especially when I remember that last tearful good-bye, and I look forward to a joy-packed reunion. That precious memory triggers another: your honest faith—and what a rich faith it is, handed down from your grandmother Lois to your mother Eunice, and now to you! And the special gift of ministry you received when I laid hands on you and prayed—keep that ablaze! God doesn't want us to be shy with his gifts, but bold and loving and sensible." 2 Timothy 1:3-7 (The Message translation)

Lately, there are many times when these words and sentiments from epistles ring true. There is a deep longing to gather, but the question quickly follows "at what risk?" As this task force looks into risk assessment, we are using a collaborative resource from the Harvard Global Health Institute, Harvard's Edmond J. Safra Center for Ethics, Rockefeller Foundation, CovidActNow, Covid-Local, CIDRAP, the Brown School of Public Health and others. This resource can be found at www.globalepidemics.org. There are three main metrics used to determine risk level (per the website listed above):

- Metric 1: New confirmed case trend: New daily cases per 100k pop (seven day rolling average); + trend direction and rate
- Metric 2: Case trend as an estimate from new deaths trend: New daily deaths per 100k pop * 100 (assuming 1% IFR) (seven day rolling average); + trend direction and rate
- Metric 3: New daily hospitalizations per 100k pop (seven day rolling average); + trend direction and rate Because case incidence numbers are affected by testing levels and deaths are a lagging indicator, it is important to track and compare both numbers and the information about cases that each provides.

Covid Risk Level	Case Incidence	
Red	>25	daily new cases per 100,000 people
Orange	10<25	daily new cases per 100,000 people
Yellow	1<10	daily new cases per 100,000 people
Green	<1	daily new case per 100,000 people

In recent weeks, the State of Iowa went from an Orange to Red risk level. Currently there are only 9 counties at Risk level Orange. Every other county is risk level RED. This includes Dallas and Polk Counties. Polk County moved form the low side of Orange to solidly in the Red over the last couple weeks. With Des Moines Public School moving into a hybrid model, there is anticipation that these numbers will continue to climb.

What does all this mean? The strong recommendation of this task force is that we stay the course with livestream of Sunday services, and If we reach the Red risk level in Polk County, we suspend private Baptisms and Funerals on site until the risk level returns to Orange or below. These are not easy recommendations to make, but they are made with care for you, and for all, in our hearts as we discern how best to move forward.

WE NEED YOUR HELP! WE NEED YOUR IDEAS!

We know that livestream of worship is not the same as in person, and that it is very difficult to maintain a sense of community through the virtual options before us. We need your ideas, even the crazy ones. I was sitting in a meeting once where the facilitator suggested that sometimes the best ideas start with someone offering an idea in the "so crazy it should get you fired" category. He used a few examples of how a far-fetched idea that came forward led to a completely different way to see the problem and an effective solution was found.

So, what are your ideas on how best to "Be the Church" during the pandemic? We do not care how far-fetched you think it is. In 2020, there is no such thing as a bad idea. Please send any and all ideas to Pastor Mike, either by email: mike@gracedm.org or by phone or voicemail, 515-276-6873.

Things are not as we wish them to be, but we will navigate these waters together.

She has found a forever family that encourages her to pursue her passions and with the support of her parents and siblings, Abby has found success as a high school wrestler, earning top awards and titles throughout her high school years.

Since being adopted into Joe and Dee's family, Abby has openly shared her story at National Adoption Month events in her community. Finance Report -September Results

Financial results for September YTD are as follows:

- Pledged Offerings Actual \$291,618, Budget \$311,975
- Other Income Actual \$16,300, Budget \$21,875
- Expenses Actual \$331,844, Budget \$339,312
- Net activity Actual (\$23,926), Budget (\$5,462)



Actual net activity was unfavorable to budget primarily due a decline in offerings. Pledged and unpledged offering are both below budget. Continued giving during these uncertain times is appreciated. Maintenance was over budget due to work on the flushing the HVAC systems. Utility activity was under budget due to lack of occupancy.

Contributions to the Capital Campaign of \$60,525 and related HVAC replacement cost of \$59,320 are not included in the above results.


No Shave November
