# **Finance Report – July Results**

Financial results for July YTD are as follows:

- Pledged Offerings Actual \$239,467, Budget \$236,742
- Other Income Actual \$11,962, Budget \$13,508
- Expenses Actual \$253,453, Budget \$267,579
- Net activity Actual (\$13,986), Budget (\$17,329)



Actual net activity was favorable to budget. While offerings continue to be below budget, certain salary and utility expenses have offset this variance to a greater extent to achieve the overall favorable results.

Each week will concern a different topic, kicked off by a short 10-minute video, and followed by group discussion on issues presented. Topics will include the history of racial constructs in America, the Bible and the role of the church, Black oppression and dehumanization, Native American oppression, intersection of race and gender, racial division within the church, and the future role of the church in fighting racism.

#### Where are They Now: Amanda and Mavis

Amanda has lived with her Host Homes mentor, Mavis, for three years and continues to gain more independence through the program. When Amanda first entered Host Homes, she required multiple psychiatric hospital visits throughout the year. She had been living in a busy home with roommates, and she needed a new environment to thrive.

When she moved in with Mavis, the two worked together to build important life skills for Amanda and find ways for her to cultivate her creative mind. Amanda loves listening to Elvis music, sewing, and ceramics, so Mavis helped Amanda enroll in art classes. When she was no longer able to attend during the pandemic, Mavis ensured she had space at home to continue creating art. Amanda recently finished a major ceramics project: a replica of Elvis she has been working on for three years.

Amanda continues to work on her goals, including personal hygiene, exercise, medication management, and cooking. Throughout the pandemic, Mavis and Amanda spent lots of time in the kitchen, and Amanda is now able to cook independently. She loves trying new dishes, and her favorite foods are pasta recipes. And instead of several emergency calls and hospital visits each year, Amanda has not needed mental health hospitalization in more than a year and a half.

"I think I'm doing really well, I've been doing lots of things," Amanda says. "I want to do even more amazing things too. I really like it here."

#### Love your Neighbor: Growing in understanding

This column is place for facts and resources about racial disparities, definitions of terms, and information about current events. We invite you to use this as a starting point to examine your own biases, expand your knowledge, do research, and for discussion.

#### DMARC takes a path to become a more equitable organization.

Grace and Grace members have contributed much over the years to DMARC. WE have collected diapers, beans, canned goods – whatever the "Donation of the Month" was – for years. We collected quarters during offering for DMARC. Members volunteer at their food pantries and in filling weekend emergency food backpacks. VBS and Confirmation students have toured their facilities and collected food to donate.

In the Fall issue of DMARCs publication The Voice, their CEO discusses formation of an Equity and Inclusion Committee, recent training to understand their implicit biases, re-evaluating policies and procedures, and looking at racial disparities in Food Insecurity. They have published a report, Racial Disparities Among People Assisted by the DMARC Food Pantry Network, available at <a href="https://www.damrcunited.org/racial-disparities">www.damrcunited.org/racial-disparities</a> We have included their executive summary here:

The DMARC Food Pantry Network conducts a short intake process for people who seek assistance. The intake process includes a number of demographic questions, including race and ethnicity. The race and ethnicity data on food pantry visitors in this report was gathered from over 58,000 individuals who used the DMARC Food Pantry Network in calendar year 2020 and sorted by city of residence based on physical address. For a full list of the DMARC partner food pantries and mobile food pantry locations where this information was gathered in 2020, please see the appendix. General population data was taken from the 2019 American Community Survey, available at census.gov/programssurveys/acs/data.html. The Des Moines Area Religious Council (DMARC) is an interfaith organization with a mission of working together to meet basic human needs for the greater Des Moines community. In 2021, DMARC commemorated the 45th anniversary of the DMARC Food Pantry Network. The DMARC Food Pantry Network consists of 14 partner pantry sites, multiple mobile food pantry locations, two food warehouses, and numerous community partners. The DMARC Food Pantry Network is committed to providing healthy food options and fresh produce to the people we assist. Once per calendar month, people can select a three-day supply of food from any one of our partner food pantries, and AnyTime Items are available whenever our partner pantries are open. DMARC could never do the work of feeding so many people without the partnership of many, diverse faith communities. Nearly 200 faith communities from across the religious spectrum support DMARC with cash support, donations of food, and service. Because we can do so much more together than we can on our own, DMARC has a commitment to building relationships between faith communities. In 2020, the DMARC Food Pantry Network assisted 58,707 unique individuals facing food insecurity in Greater Des Moines through 14 partner food pantries and 30+ mobile food pantry locations. While the majority of those people assisted were white, Black/African American, Asian, and other non-white residents saw disparities among those assisted by the DMARC Food Pantry Network compared to the general population. This disparity was also seen in regards to people with Hispanic ethnicity. As this report makes clear, food insecurity is experienced by people of all races and ethnicities, but non-white and Hispanic people in Greater Des Moines experience food insecurity and need to turn to food pantries at a disproportionately higher rate. In every city in this report, Black/African American, Hispanic, and multi-race residents experienced food insecurity at a disproportionately higher rate, as did Asian residents in all cities with the exception of West Des Moines. The reasons behind this disparity are not happenstance. While our society has made progress, the history of racial discrimination in housing, education, healthcare, employment, political representation, the justice system, the financial system, and other systems and institutions goes back hundreds of years, and we continue to see the impacts of these racist policies to this day. Racial disparities in food insecurity and other intersecting issues of poverty are still prevalent in our nation, state, and local community. DMARC is committed to finding equitable solutions to food insecurity in Greater Des Moines, and one of the first steps in that process is recognizing disparities as they exist today.

#### Other ideas

# Personal hygiene items:

Socks and hats as the weather cools.

Hand warmers for cold nights.

Soap, deodorant, small bottles of shampoo and conditioner.

Hair brushes and combs, nail trimmers, hair ties, shoelaces, pads, tampons.

Consider personal wipes as those who are houseless may not have a way to clean up.

Hand sanitizer.

Napkins and Kleenex packs.

#### Food items:

Canned goods with can openers.

Spices and herbs: these add so much to a meal and are well appreciated. Even salt and pepper sets are often a luxury.

Teabags, hot chocolate packs – a warm cup of tea can be calming and relaxing to a stressed parent.

#### Recipe bags:

We know many of you like to do this: Put a favorite recipe in a brown bag with all the ingredients (and perhaps a gift card to a local grocery if meat or dairy items are required). Staple the bag shut, label the front with "Ingredients and recipe for (name of recipe).

#### Other Little Free Pantries:

If you bring items to the pantry at Grace and it is full (we know it doesn't remain that way for long), consider looking to see if the LFP at Perkins, Hillis, Merrill, or on the Drake campus are empty.
