Held via Zoom Teleconferencing Application

After a quorum was established, the meeting was called to order by Congregation President Tammy Denton at 10:17 AM. Some brief guidance was given concerning how to participate in a remote meeting.

Devotions:

Pastor Mike Schmidt led the assembly in devotions with a reading from the 3rd chapter of John. We are born of the spirit. When God sent serpents to punish the Children of Israel wandering in the wilderness, He had Moses make a bronze serpent to set on a pole. Anyone who was repentant, even though that person had been bitten by a serpent, would live. God didn't take away the pain of the venom but provided a way to work through it. In the same manner, He has provided us with Christ to help us find a way through the pain and anguish we experience, especially during these trying times of pandemic and other hardships.

Rich Snyder was appointed Parliamentarian.

• It was moved, seconded and passed to adopt the minutes from the 2020 Annual Congregational Meeting as written.

Elections

President Denton opened nominations from the floor to elect voting members to the 2021 Southeastern Iowa
Synod Assembly. Carol Woodruff and Jessye Flannery were nominated and elected by motion of acclamation.
Gary Nehmer was elected by motion of acclamation to serve as a member of the Endowment Committee.

Aaron Brandsfield, Dean Watson, Tom McCleary, and Linda Moravec were elected by motion of acclamation to serve on the Church Council.

Budget

Kevin Krause presented the Financial Report & the 2021 Grace Lutheran Church and Grace Kids Care budgets. He noted that with the pandemic causing some closure of the daycare and suspension of in-person worship and meetings there were some financial difficulties. Thanks to the Cares Act, the continued pledge offerings, and the hard work of our staff, Daycare Director, Finance Committee, and President Denton we came through 2020 in reasonably good financial shape. Thanks were extended to all involved in working on financial solutions & keeping the daycare open as much as possible.

· It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the FY 2021 budget for Grace Lutheran Church.

· It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the FY 2021 budget for Grace Kids Care.

· Special thanks to President Denton for guiding the Council through a very difficult year!

Report from the Congregational Council President John Roehrick

This past year has been interesting to say the least, but Grace continues to be strong and committed to our mission – a community of faith, strengthened in love and centered in worship, leading to Discipleship and Community in the name of Jesus. Unfortunately, one of our outreaches into the community – Grace Kids Care -- closed after over twenty (20) years of service.

However, with the guidance of our Health and Safety Task Force, we were able to re-open the church for worship services and other events. The task force continues to work and guide the staff and council with respect to the ongoing issues of Covid and the impact on the services. Hopefully, in 2022 we will be able to expand the in-person services and continue with the on-line services, which are of benefit to many of our members.

The congregation is to be complemented for stepping forward with its financial support. Because of this, our property maintenance went forward, and we were able to meet budget. With the forgiveness of the Payroll Protection Program loans by the government we have a reserve for the future. Though the funds are a reserve they do not supplant the need for continued stewardship from the Congregation to meet the 2022 budget and our Capital Campaign which was postponed in 2020.

As we look forward to 2022, council and staff will be working to learn from the congregation its vision for the future; the goals for our mission; and its outreach into the community, recognizing that for the foreseeable future Grace will be a hybrid-congregation (in person and online).

Finally, I want to thank Pastor Mike for his leadership and ministry; Denise, Michelle, Emma, Rich, Todd and Jessye for their commitment to keeping the machine well-oiled and always moving forward.

We have much for which to be thankful and I personally wish everyone a blessed year and peace through Jesus Christ.

Pastor's Report 2021 Pastor Michael Schmidt

"If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing." 1 Corinthians 13:1-3

I find myself looping back to these words from Paul's letter to the people of Corinth. There was a great deal of quarrelling about how best to be the church. Paul reminds them of the simple truth: if what you do is not centered in love, it really doesn't matter. This has been a guiding principle in our decisions these last months. We have been very intentional, making sure that our decisions are guided by love. These decisions could be seen as being driven by fear, but it is a deep love that guides us.

The last year has seen many such decisions. We were one of the last ELCA congregations to move to in person worship indoors. Even recently, we canceled the Christmas Day service and moved the services for December 26 and January 2 to a virtual format only. We made the decision to close Grace Kids Care, a ministry of Grace Lutheran Church for more than two decades. In the end, it was not fair to the children, families, or staff to stay open amid such uncertainty. These are not decisions that were taken lightly. They are decisions that are centered in love.

In many ways, it has been a difficult year. From the loss of my younger brother, the closing of Grace Kids Care and the departure of Ellen, to the lingering impact of Covid, it has been tough. I would be lying if I said that it did not take a toll on me personally and professionally. There are years like that. As Paul reminds us, "Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends." There may be years like this, but love remains, and bears all things.

I have felt an incredible outpouring of love this year. Between the death of my brother, Jason, and my dealing with Covid, I have received such love and support from you all. Thank you! It has been such a blessing to serve here for the last ten years, and I look forward to many more together.

I am filled with hope and love as we look to the future of God's ministry at Grace Lutheran Church. The Congregational Council has made the decision to apply to become an internship site. We were close to having the budget to call as Associate Pastor. With the unknown costs of insurance, it was decided to pursue becoming a teaching site for seminary students. I believe this is a great fit for Grace Lutheran Church and gives us the opportunity to shape leaders within the ELCA. Grace Lutheran Church is a special place, and we will be able to teach others what a community of faith can be.

We do not know exactly what the future holds, but we do know that it is held in love. May that be our guide as we navigate these waters of mission and ministry together.

Report from the Director of Communications Michelle Voelker

All of the communication adjustments we put in place during 2020 continued to serve us well in 2021.

Staffing changes and the empty building were and continue to be an adjustment. The building is too quiet without the daycare staff and children, and the office is quieter as staff continue to rotate through the office as needed and with the absence of Ellen. However, we have become even more comfortable and adept at collaborating, brainstorming, supporting, and socializing over the past 6 months whether in person, zooming from separate offices while in the building together, or all working remotely. I am looking forward to bringing a new staff member/intern into the mix, and the possibility of the building being in use more frequently.

- The Tuesday enews continues to be sent weekly, and we've had a few more contributors this past year.
- The Street sign helps to let people know we are still open for Worship. We do gets calls occasionally about things we post there, whether the Little Free Pantry, Christmas Eve worship, or other events rare as those may be these past 2 years.
- The website news and calendar continue to be updated frequently, and are the most up-to-date source of information for any last minute changes.
- Facebook continues to be a good source of sharing information and interaction with neighborhood entities, and a well viewed domain of Pastor Mike's with Morning Prayer and Worship viewership. The Private Facebook Page Abiding Grace is not the active community we had envisioned, but given everyone's exhaustion with all things "online" it has settled into a nice space for occasional sharing and community.
- Mass mailings (and the time involved) tapered off drastically, though we do continue to mail some items to all or sections of membership as appropriate.
- Worship Materials continue to be mailed weekly to those who request, and are well received. We stopped emailing the materials mid-year, as the bulletins are available online or by mail, and as a measure of creating less clutter in members inboxes. However, worship is now recorded and reliably available our website (live on Sunday and archived in Resources) as well as continuously available on our Facebook page. In addition we are excited to have returned to our pre-pandemic Bulletin style for in-person worship, mailings, and website resources. It's the little things that bring us joy!
- **Newsletter**The Friendly Visitor remains much the same, with 13 issues per year. We continue to receive contributions from the membership and community, more than making up for the lack of calendar items. We have added "Love Your Neighbor" column, which highlights diversity, inclusion, and other topics for growth.
- Advertising We continue to adjust targeted advertising in print and media as needed, mostly saving budget on these items in 2021 to avoid advertising something that would change a week or two later. This proved to be a good strategy, but we are looking forward to a time when we can again advertise more confidently to a wider market.

Thank you for allowing me to continue to serve the Grace Community. I have felt your much needed support this past year and it has been much appreciated.

Worship is now in-person, the building is more open to activities, and we were able to incorporate more special music into worship services. The pandemic year necessitated adapting to remote worship, which has actually been a positive change and won't be reversed post-2020. Closing Grace Kids Care, while a gut-wrenching decision, necessitated some cleaning and clearing of the physical spaces and enabled us to see more clearly the opportunities for different ministries that require building space. Worshipping in-person was once an ordinary aspect of church life, but 2020 made us realize that being together and seeing our friends face to face is one of the most life-giving aspects that we won't soon take for granted.

None of those pandemic-year adaptations are going away, but there are still some aspects of worship life that haven't gone back to normal. The warmer months earlier this year were such a blessing in that Grace Chancel Choir felt safe coming together to sing! Even though we didn't quite feel safe enough to sing inperson during worship, it was wonderful to meet up and sing after a more than a year of silence. Luckily we now have the A/V crew to help us participate in worship virtually, and Grace Bells has played in worship more now that we've figured out how to minimize risk in the sanctuary.

My activities in 2021 included:

- \cdot Meeting with the Health and Safety Task Force to help navigate in-person worship during and post-pandemic.
- \cdot Being a part of the staff planning for the church-wide cleanup.
- · Planning and playing for worship.

 \cdot Organizing musician volunteers for Sunday worship, hosting bell rehearsals, and briefly rehearsing and recording with the choir.

- · Helping with K-5 Sunday School.
- · Collaborating with staff and Church Council regarding mission statement development.

Bringing joy through music is always possible, and I hope to see the music ministry operating normally in the near future.

I am so very grateful for and appreciative of the Sunday morning worship volunteers who share their time and expertise each week. Thank you!

Education Report

It has been a difficult year in the life of the global Church, and Grace Lutheran Church is no different. The last 22 months have proven difficult for education, in school, home, and congregation. As I reflect on the last year, I am reminded of these words from Ecclesiastes:

"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens: a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot, a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance..." Ecclesiastes 3:1-4

We hear these words most often during funeral services. They came to mind for that very reason. At first glance, it can feel like education is dwindling away under the pressures of a lingering pandemic. Those realities, partnered with the loss of Grace Kids Care and Ellen accepting a position at a different congregation, heighten that feeling of grief and loss. Instead of dwelling there, I invite you to also reflect on the words that follow the oft quoted excerpt:

"What do workers gain from their toil? I have seen the burden God has laid on the human race. ¹¹He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet^[a] no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end. I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. That each of them may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God." Ecclesiastes 3:9-13

We are finding happiness, and doing the good that we can, while we endure this pandemic together.

Some of these highlights include a journey through the "Dialogues on Race" materials from Augsburg Fortress. We had a total of 30 participants with 10 leaders in the Spring, and nearly as many again in the Fall of 2021 during the Education Hour following Worship. Sunday School returned in October of 2021. They have met the first three Sundays of each month during the Education Hour and have coordinated Mission Opportunities for the congregation. The class size may be down, but the happiness and good that is done is making an impact. The work of Confirmation continues through mentorship and classroom study. There was also an All Church VBS this last May under the theme of "Sowing God's Love."

2021 may not have been the year that we hoped for, but I do believe it has been the year that we needed. It has offered a time of reflection, and an opportunity to return to the basics of faith and education. We have continued to find ways to be church and to embrace the work of faith formation and education. I am grateful for the work of Ellen Rothweiler and her faithfulness to the people of God at Grace Lutheran Church. I am also extremely grateful for the work of the volunteers who have stepped up with all the education endeavors this past year. You are all amazing. Thank you.

Altar Guild

The Altar Guild members at Grace prepare the altar for Sunday worship and assist with communion preparations and cleanup. Other responsibilities include any special preparation for the seasons of the church year such as Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter, and special events such as baptisms, weddings and funerals.

The group handles the care and maintenance of the paraments, linens, banners, and candles as needed for worship services. The following items were purchased throughout the year:

- Communion supplies
- Candle oil
- Cleaning supplies
- Seasonal supplies and decorations

A smaller group is designated for handling funerals and has helped prepare for those services this year that could be held at church. These are volunteers who help to prepare for the services as needed to meet the requests of the families for the worship space.

Altar Guild members resumed regular meetings as everyone was vaccinated; meeting outside or masked as the situation dictated. We used that time for fellowship and to discuss the group's duties for the next month. We ended our year by decorating the church for Christmas and then going on a "Nativity Crawl" to celebrate the end of another year.

There were 11 volunteers that served on Altar Guild in 2021. Ten of those members will continue their service for 2022, with Cindy Peeler stepping back due to the continued strain of COVID on our healthcare workers. Report from Cradle Roll

The Cradle Roll program ministers to parents with children between the ages of birth through age three.

"Splash!" materials from Augsburg Fortress press are used. The "Splash!" materials were updated during the past year in order to be more relevant to today's parenting. Each month the parents receive a "Parent Page" appropriate for the age of their child. A music CD is included with the first parent page and again at the child's 1st and 2nd birthdays. The materials are supplemented with additional materials at Christmas, Easter, and the child's third birthday.

There are currently fifteen children enrolled in the Grace Cradle Roll.

Two member children were baptized during 2021. At the time of baptism, the parents are presented with a bible for their child. A wooden dove with the child's name and baptismal date is added to the Baptismal Roll in the sanctuary. The dove is sent to the parents prior to the first anniversary of their child's baptism. The bibles were purchased with funds received from the Grace Endowment Fund. Len Ringgenberg makes the doves which have been donated by Len and Helen in memory of their grandson, Alec Freese.

In September, two of the children aged out of the program.

Expenses include "Splash!" materials, postage, mailing and supplemental materials.

Report from the Companion Congregation Committee

The year has been difficult in Msindo and Mararo. The two churches cover a large area on the mountain and serve five to six hundred people, adults and children. The rains did not come on schedule (they have two rainy seasons and it is usually quite dry the rest of the year.) Hopefully, rain came after we spoke, but weather is unpredictable, as we in a farming state know.

The president of Tanzania, John Magufuli, said Covid was successfully being treated with home remedies. He died of Covid a few months later. The new president is the first woman, Samia Suluhu Hassan. This summer, we received an urgent message from Pastor John Joseph Mshana asking us to help find hand sanitizer for the churches (something hard to find there because the virus was near.) I talked to the doctor who consults and works with Empower Tanzania. He recommended helping with finding masks since other forms of hand washing are available there.

Our committee acted quickly to save lives: we sent masks (through Amazon) for the first line of defense and followed with money to purchase additional masks as needed. A local industry has developed among seamstresses to make masks of cloth, as has happened here. It seemed like the best solution to encourage local business, reduce transportation costs, and protect people from illness. I hope you approve of our actions.

One of our founding committee members, Azza Mmbaga, died in January, and his wife, Namkunda, who has been suffering from ill health, moved to Tanga to live with a daughter's family. What a huge loss! When we think of hospitality and wisdom, and successful joint ventures, we think of Azza and Namkunda, like Denny and Pat Rehder here. In the past, we would have sought their wisdom and guidance to come up with the best solutions. We miss them. When I think of Msindo, I think of Azza and Namkunda with love and admiration, and their home as a center of God's love and activities.

Finally, we are looking for new members for our Companion Congregation Committee. We have not been as active for the last few years, but as Covid restrictions are loosened, we would like to go for another visit. If you are interested, please contact Mary Freimuth Helt or Jane Ridnour.

On December 30, 2022, another of our original committee members will be retiring from the ministry. Pastor Ombeni Mbaga has a home in Msindo and was the pastor during our first visit. He has kindly invited us to attend his party. Congratulations to Ombeni on his devotion to ministry and retirement.

Report from the Grace Garden Committee

We reviewed what worked well and decided what new things we wanted to try. We each signed up to purchase some of the seeds and plants. Carla drew up the garden map to hang in the shed.

The garden remains incredibly productive.

- We grew peas, okra, broccoli, Swiss Chard, tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, beans, pole beans, turnips, kohlrabi, beets, carrots, radishes, tomatillos, white and purple eggplant, and onions. Some of the crops, such as eggplant, tomatoes, peppers, and okra were incredibly prolific for the small amount of space they used.
- We planted sweet potatoes in grow bags outside of the garden again. This year they were especially prolific, with one of our best harvests yet.
- A variety of squash and radishes were planted with the help of the Grace Kids Care 3 year old class. Some of the squash seeds saved from previous years mutated, producing an orange acorn/delicata mutation, but still tasty.
- Beans and Okra were highly prized at the food pantry.

Little Free Pantry: We continued to place small amounts of produce at the Little Free pantry on harvest days. Most of it was picked up within hours. Occasionally someone would ask about produce as we packed up for the day and they were able to "shop" through what was available. Several of us have noted that in 2 hours of garden work we often see 3-4 people stop at the LFP, some filling it, some taking what they need. Many are friendly and stop to talk.

Compost: We were able to top off another raised bed with our own finished compost, and at the end of Fall 2021, have yet another bin of almost finished compost that should be ready by planting time. The emptied bins were filled to the top during garden cleanup.

Help: Help us plan, starting seeds, providing plants, planting, watering, harvesting, and/or cleanup. One or two hours a summer or a week, the garden is a lovely place to rest, listen to nature, breathe deeply, and serve others. You won't regret any time spent there. Come sit on the bench in the garden and enjoy the peace. Contact any of the garden crew– we promise to help and respect your time.

Report from the Property Committee

While we had all hoped that "normalcy" would return in 2021 after suffering through the effects of COVID 19 in 2020, such was not the case. Resumption of full activities and normal operation still awaits the time when the health concerns related to the pandemic are in our rear-view mirror. Much of what we had hoped to do from a property improvement standpoint has again been delayed, but there were some actions taken by both choice and necessity.

Maintenance items and property improvements made during 2021 include:

- Landscaping at and near the Little Free Pantry and Library (funded by a generous grant from the Endowment Committee).
- Cleanup and repairs necessitated by a sewer backup in Msindo Hall on September 11, 2021. Expenses for which we were fully reimbursed by the City of Des Moines.
- Purchase and installation of 7 new high efficiency furnaces serving sanctuary, Msindo Hall & Upper Room.
- Boilers: Hydronic loop and boilers that serve new addition, Grace Hall and 3rd floor have been noisy for over a year; the source of the issue has been identified and a permanent fix is underway.
- Minor repairs and upgrades at Todd's House (3024 52nd Street)
- HVAC system setting were adjusted after GKC closed due to lower occupancy during the week.
- Also, with closure of GKC, our 10-burner gas stove/oven in kitchen is not being used; vendor came in and has temporarily turned off the pilot lights for energy savings.

As was true last year, while one would think that limited use of our facility for this past year would mean less "wear and tear" on things, the mechanical systems, lighting and plumbing are still needed and require regular maintenance, and the forces of mother nature on the exterior of the building are still at work, with the effects they have on roofs, walls, windows and doors.

In 2019, work was begun on planning for a Capital Campaign that we had hoped would have been conducted in 2020. This campaign has again been delayed. Most of the needs that would be addressed by a Capital Campaign still exist, such that we hope to resume planning for this during this upcoming year.

The Property Committee again wishes to thank our custodian, Todd Haugen for keeping the building and grounds well cared for and for all his work to accommodate the many activities that take place within the church every week. We would also like to thank the members of the property committee, and all others, including the Willing Workers and the Saturday Morning Men's Group, who contribute their time and talents to the upkeep and improvement of the church property.

A special thank you to Eric Weber for his continual efforts to ensure that our heating, ventilating and air conditioning systems are in proper working order. Eric was instrumental in overseeing the replacement of the seven furnaces that serve the Sanctuary, Msindo Hall and the Upper Room in November.

We are grateful for all Grace volunteers! Our Grace group of Willing Workers meets on most Thursday mornings at 9 a.m. to help with a variety of property needs. And the Saturday Men's Group meets for devotions, donuts and tasks on the second Saturday of the month. More volunteers are always welcome.

As stated in the 2020 Property Committee report, we are hoping to reorganize and revitalize the Property Committee, with an emphasis on encouraging individual members and congregational organizations to "adopt" portions of the physical plant to address specific needs for continual cleaning and maintenance. The details of this plan have still not been put into action. Please consider how you might be able to contribute to this effort with the giving of your time and talents.

Grace Lutheran Church has a Columbarium in the Prayer Chapel. Grace's Columbarium is a fortyeight companion Garden Niche Columbarium that accommodates a maximum of ninety-six cremation urns. The purchase price of each niche is \$1,200.

It has always been the obligation of the church to serve its congregation from baptism to death. Although earth burial on church grounds is not feasible at Grace, the desire to continue this sacred rite remains for some members.

The Columbarium at Grace allows us to revive the crucial ministry of offering a rightful place at the church for those who have come before us. It also comforts the living with the knowledge that we too will be welcomed home to the church.

Report of the Endowment Committee

The purpose of the Grace Lutheran Church Endowment Fund is to promote faithful Christian stewardship by providing a congregational plan to receive grants, gifts or bequest of money to be used to enhance the total program and mission of the Church beyond that supported through regular giving and apart from the general operation of the congregation. The Endowment Fund Committee acts as custodian of the Fund.

The Endowment Committee approved the following distributions of 2020 income, which was distributed in March of 2021.

Awards to Grace Lutheran Church:

- \$2,500 for sidewalks and landscaping
- \$460 for Kids Care strollers
- \$283 for Kids Care closet

Other Awards:

- \$7,000 to Lutheran Lakeside Camp for event center deck repair
- \$1,500 to Another Child Foundation for Noemi's closet

A total of \$11,743 was awarded. Requests for grants totaled \$20,970.

Since inception, the Endowment fund has awarded a total of **\$349,583** to **191** projects.

Report of the Finance Committee

Grace Lutheran Church

The Church results were above budget in 2021. Overall, a surplus of \$57,948 was incurred as compared to a \$20,000 deficit budget. This was primarily due to the forgiveness of the \$44,510 Payroll protection program loan the Church received in 2020. The results were also impacted with the departure of the Director of Youth and Family during the year.

Highlights of actual activity include the following:

- Pledged, unpledged and other offerings were below prior year but comparable to budget.
- Overall, expenses were below budget. This was primarily due to the open staffing position, lower utilities offset by higher maintenance.

Budgeted activity for 2022 reflects a surplus of \$5,000. Highlights include the following:

- Pledged offering activity is above 2021 actual activity, while pledging units are down.
- Other income has decreased with the elimination of the Daycare thank offering.
- Budget for 2022 replaces the youth and family position with an intern pastor position whose budgeted activity is only for a portion of the year due to the timing in filling the position.
- Overall staffing costs are comparable to 2021 but lower than 2021 budgeted activity. Total staffing costs are approximately \$245,000 and represent 57% of the total operational costs of the Church.
- The budget for the professional leadership positions includes salary, employer taxes, pension and medical insurance.
- Synod Benevolence is unchanged from 2021.
- All other expense activity is comparable to the prior year.
- The activity for debt service reflects interest only on the debt to the Endowment Fund. This \$275,000 debt has an interest rate of 3%.

Not included in the above results is the activity of the Capital Campaign. During 2021, \$168,296 was received from members, estates and Daycare, \$32,584 was spent on furnace replacements. For the entire campaign, \$229,221 has been received and \$91,904 spent on building improvements.

Grace Daycare

Grace Daycare closed during the year due to Covid. Staffing challenges and declines in student enrollment led to this decision. During 2020 the Daycare received a PPP loan from the Federal Government of \$69,307. This was forgiven in 2021. These monies along with the final cash balance of \$15,609 were transferred to the Grace Capital Campaign.

Change and the need for creativity have become constants over the last year and a half in many aspects of life, including the church. This was the case for **Living Christ** Lutheran Church in Flagstaff, Ariz., even before a global pandemic caused many of us to rethink what it means to be church. Generosity from all three expressions of the ELCA (the churchwide organization, the Grand Canyon Synod and members of Living Christ) helped turn a congregation "on the road out of town, near the mall" into an online presence reaching over 500 people a week from Phoenix to the Philippines. (Read more about Living Christ in the current issue of "Stories of Faith in Action" at ELCA.org/SOFIA.)

Many other congregations have found new ways to connect both when inperson worship was impossible and when congregations began to return to their sanctuaries. Generosity, especially through Mission Support, helped us find and support these new ways of being connected. Early in the pandemic, ELCA Worship launched the "Worship in the Home" webpage, with Scripture, hymn links, prayers and reflections for each Sunday. These resources were and continue to be used in congregations across the ELCA—even at <u>Sitka Lutheran Church</u> in Alaska, whose members printed and handdelivered "Worship in the Home" resources to fellow members without internet access.

Change and creativity have taught us many things. As Pastor Sandra Rudd of Sitka Lutheran Church noted, "The pandemic was a stark illustration of the fact that the church is not a building. A lot of people say that, but we didn't fully know it until we didn't have a building to use. We learned that there are many ways to be connected as the church." Throughout the pandemic, the ELCA has changed and adapted, doing ministry in new and creative ways, because of the generosity of its members. Even now, you may be gathering in a new way for your annual meeting, to discern how you will steward the gifts shared generously with your congregation to do ministry in your community and beyond. As you have these important conversations, remember that your gifts of time, talent and resources have helped create new spaces beyond our walls and buildings where we continue to worship, serve and love God and each other.
