Do

Do you ever feel stuck? If you are blessed to live long enough, you have probably encountered that feeling. Sometimes often. It can be because of work, or family. It can be the uncertainty of a lingering pandemic and the feeling of languishing. It can be unhealthy habits or ways of coping. It happens, and there is no shame in it. How we respond is what matters most.

Many times, I have heard someone say, "Fake it 'til you make it." Usually, this has to do with the emotions involved when one feels stuck. If you can just fake it, the feeling may stick. Suppressing, or hiding, emotions will not make them go away or change them. Hiding emotions leaves room for them to begin to manifest in other ways. This can lead to using something else to numb or suppress these feelings, leaving you even worse off than before.

Other times, people suggest self help books. This option sounds logical and is a huge improvement over suppressing emotion. However, it does not often lead to substantive change. From experience, it often leads to a deeper sense of being stuck. It is easy to become angry with yourself when you know what you need to do but are not able to do it.

When Jesus encountered people who were feeling stuck, he did not ask them to "fake it" or give a TED Talk or offer a self-help book. Jesus often responded with a command, "Do." Jesus asked the response to be in the body instead of the heart or head. Father Richard Rohr, an American Franciscan priest, and educator on Contemplative Practices, explains it this way: "We do not think ourselves into new ways of living. We live ourselves into new ways of thinking." When you are stuck, the journey forward starts with action, leaving room for the head and heart to follow.

This will be our focus this Easter Season. Whether you feel stuck, or simply want to enhance your faith journey, there is something we can all learn from leading with actions. This is not the normal Lutheran response to things. We usually prefer task forces, committees, and time to ponder. Jesus calls us to "Do." That may look different each week, and we will explore that together.

When Christ rose from the tomb, allowing us to rise with Him, the ultimate "Do" has already been done.

#### **Notes from Rich**

The topic last month in "Notes from Rich" was the postlude. The topic this month will address two related questions, "Why are there so many pipes in the organ?" or, "How many pipes are there?" The second question is the more easily answered one. A pipe organ is composed of groups of pipes; each group is called a rank. The name comes from the physical presentation of the pipes; they are usually arranged in single or double rows from tallest to shortest as though they were marching. Multiple groupings of pipes are arranged in parallel with each other, so each different parallel grouping is a called a rank (think of rank and file formations). The Schantz organ at Grace has 25 ranks of pipes which tot



formations). The Schantz organ at Grace has 25 ranks of pipes which total 1,486 individual pipes. This is a moderate number of pipes; some organs have multiple thousands of pipes.

Answering the first question requires an understanding of the function of the individual pipe in the organ. In biology, a group of tissues in one location that function differently is called an organ (think heart or liver), so a musical instrument which produces a variety of sounds from multiple and different components is called an organ. The pipe is the fundamental unit of the pipe organ. Each pipe produces a sound by directing a flow of air through a slit near the bottom of the pipe resulting in vibrations of the air. The length of the pipe selects one fundamental vibration (pitch) and amplifies it. The speed of the airflow governs the volume of the sound. The characteristics of the sound, i.e. the timbre, are governed by the shape and physical composition of the pipe. Each pipe produces one pitch at a set volume with a singular predetermined timbre.

The two manuals (keyboards) on the Schantz organ each have 61 keys (a piano has 88). The pedal board (played with the feet) has 32 pedals. If only one manual plus the pedal board were used, a minimum of 93 pipes would be required. An organ with only one manual rank and one pedal rank would work, but there would be no variety in the volume of the sounds. For each gradation in the volume of the sound, an additional rank would be required. In addition, just as a marching band has a variety of timbres from its component instruments, e.g. brass, reed, or woodwind instruments, a similar variety of sounds is desirable from a pipe organ. For each change in the timbre, another rank is required.

Finally, the pipes in the organ are grouped into divisions (military terminology again). In general, the pipes producing the louder sounds are grouped in the great division, and they are played using the lower manual. The softer pipes and those with a larger variety of timbres are grouped in the swell division and are played with the upper manual. The mixing of the various sounds from the pipes by the organist is called registering the instrument, and it is the way great sounds are generated from such a swell instrument.

#### **Endowment Fund Report**

The purpose of the Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church Endowment Fund is to promote faithful Christian stewardship by providing a congregational plan to receive grants, gifts or bequest of money to be used to enhance the total program and mission of Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church beyond that supported through regular giving and apart from the general operation of the congregation. The Endowment Fund Committee acts as custodian of the Fund.

The Endowment Committee approved the following distributions of 2021 income:

Awards to Grace Lutheran Church:

- \$5,000 for property and landscape improvements between the deck at the Sexton (custodian) house and the northwest (Grace Hall) entrance
- \$380 for technology shelving and a flatbed cart

#### Other Awards:

- \$2,500 to Nutrition 4 Young Children for Baby Shower supplies
- \$2,500 to Lutheran Services in Iowa for Global Green equipment

A total of \$10,380 was awarded. Requests for grants totaled \$10,380.

Since inception, the Endowment fund has awarded a total of \$359,963 to 195 projects.

- Thanks to the dedication of Lutheran quilters and kit-makers, 8,000 care kits and 7,400 quilts are being shipped and distributed to our neighbors directly impacted by this crisis.
