#### Sending Hymns

There can be a tangible energy in the Sanctuary during the sending hymn. I have noticed this a few times recently. One such occurrence was on June 12<sup>th</sup> as my family and I were in rural LeMars for the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Christ Lutheran Church. I served there as an interim pastor and was invited back to take part in the festivities. We sang "On our Way Rejoicing" and there was a feeling of celebration in the air as we departed the worship space and move toward fellowship over a shared meal.

I felt a similar energy on June 19<sup>th</sup> as we sang "Sent Forth By God's Blessing." There was a noticeable energy as Vicary Bunny was blessed, and an eagerness to welcome her as people were leaving the worship space. There was excitement in the air, and beautiful welcome that followed.

There is something beautiful about the Sending Hymn. Growing up, I would often rejoice at the Sending Hymn, largely because it meant that we could head home for Sunday lunch. We would start to put the hymnals away during the last stanza, trying to memorize enough of the words that we could keep singing while preparing to leave. If one packed up too early and had to stop singing, there would be a disapproving look coming from Dad.

In these examples, what followed the Sending Hymn was a time of food and fellowship. These are important tasks of the church. It is important to build relationships and find ways to strengthen one another for the journey. It is also important to gather over food. There is something spiritual about the sharing of a meal. In the Gospel according to Saint Luke, the theme of fellowship and food runs through the whole of the Gospel. The encounters with the risen Christ are also centered around food. That is the place where the risen Christ is made known. This is important work, but not the only work of the church.

As I get older, I find a deeper appreciation for the Sending Hymn. It is less of a close to our time in worship as it is the start of the work of the Church. The measure of a congregation is not about what happens on an hour or two on Sunday morning. It is about what we do when we are sent out into the world through the Sending Hymn. That is when the real work of the church begins.

#### **Notes from Rich**

In conversations that I've had regarding the pipe organ, one question often asked is, "Is playing the organ the same as playing the piano?" Or, "How does playing the organ differ from playing the piano?" This edition of Notes will provide some answers to these questions. The simple answer is, "Yes, they are similar, but no, they are not played the same way." While the motions with the fingers are similar in playing the two keyboard instruments, the skills necessary to control those motions in order that good music is produced are quite different.



Confused? Consider the following analogy. The differences between playing a piano and an organ are similar to the differences between playing a violin and a banjo. Both instruments employ the fingers on the left hand to select the pitch of the sound by pressing down on the strings against the fingerboard. But the right hand draws a bow across the violin strings to make them vibrate while the banjo strings are plucked or strummed to produce its sound. The violin and banjo are string instruments with four strings (usually), but from that similarity the methods to produce music with them are quite different.

There are three fundamental characteristics of musical sounds: pitch, volume, and timbre. Pitch is highness or lowness of a sound, volume is the loudness of the sound, and timbre is the distinctive characteristic of the sound. A brief discussion of the techniques used to control each of these three characteristics for organ and piano follows.

#### Pitch

Selecting the musical pitch is similarly controlled on organ and piano: pressing down on a key (and a pedal for the organ). The piano has 88 black or white keys and thus 88 different pitches. The organ generally has 61 keys on each of its keyboards (manuals) and 32 pedals on the pedal board. However, the organ, as a result of the wide variation in the size of its pipes in different ranks may produce pitches that are higher and lower than the limits of the piano keyboard. Just as a symphony orchestra has instruments in the soprano, alto, tenor, and bass ranges, the pipe organ has ranks of pipes that also can be classified as occupying one or more of these pitch ranges.

#### Volume

For the piano, the volume of the sound is determined at the moment the finger presses down (strikes) the key. The key movement forces a felt-covered hammer to hit from one to three strings. The harder the force of the finger, the harder the hammer impinges on the strings and the louder the sound. But immediately, the volume of the sound will decrease and be will be terminated when either the finger is removed from the key, or if the damper pedal is depressed, when the pedal is released. The volume can also be affected by depressing the soft pedal which for a grand piano shifts the keyboard such that only two of the three strings are hit by the hammer. (For an upright piano, a felt damper lays across the strings reducing the volume.) The effective or comparative volume of a piano note is enhanced by the fact that the sound decreases immediately, so the next note, even if struck with an equal force on the key, will sound louder than the preceding note which has already decreased in volume. In the most basic terms, the volume of the sound from a piano is predominantly controlled by the attack of the fingers on the keyboard. By striking some notes harder, certain pitches can be emphasized and be heard as the melody within the music.

For the organ, the volume of the sound is determined before the key or pedal is depressed. The rank(s) of pipes selected by the organist to sound when the key is depressed determines the volume. In some cases, the sound can be modified by closing or opening the shades of the box enclosing the pipes, but exposed pipes make only one sound at only one volume. Some ranks of pipes are louder than others, so rank selection affects the volume. **Continued on page 6**

Adding more ranks adds to the volume. The perceived volume of the organ sound can be affected by the length of time the note is held. Just as the sound of a crying baby becomes more irritating and seems louder the longer the child cries, notes from the pipe organ seem to get louder the longer they are held. On the other hand, holding notes for a shorter time than indicated in the musical score brings out the next note, a practice called articulation. This happens because the short break between successive notes causes the new note to sound against a softer background of sound and thus be perceived as louder to the ear. Thus at a fundamental level, piano music is most affected by the attack on the keyboard while organ music is greatly dependent on the release of the key. My organ teacher once quoted one of her instructors as saying, "Any fool musician can mash down a bunch of keys; it takes a true artist to know when to release them."

#### Timbre

The timbre of a piano depends on the builder, and it is affected by the size (length) of the piano, the bridging (single of double), and the size of the strings, the tension on the strings, the sound board construction, and the key action. Other than changing the firmness of the felt hammers, not much can be done to change the voice of the piano once it has been constructed. The organ can produce a wide variety of sounds (timbres) which are controlled by the ranks selected to sound when the instrument is played. Sounds described as bright, calm, smooth, nasal, breathy, hollow, flute-like, or reedy are available to the organist. Once a group of pipes has been selected, the organist is stuck with that sound until a different group of pipes is selected (called changing the registration). The methods to change the registration on the fly (i.e. while playing the instrument), will be a good topic for a future Notes article.

The motions of the fingers when playing a piano keyboard or an organ manual are similar, but the skills necessary to control the fingers in their attack and release from the keyboards are quite different. The joy in this situation is that one technique does not supplant the other. A few minutes might have to pass to remind the fingers which instrument is being played, but fortunately they soon remember.

#### **Restoring Hope**

In December 2021, for the first time in 10 years, LSI began welcoming new arrivals to Iowa, and we have since welcomed more than 165 individuals – including many families – to their new home in Iowa. Thanks to the support of our partners, Iowa continues to be a space of welcome, a place where individuals can find safety, security, and a community where they can rebuild their lives.

#### **Finance Report – May Results**

Financial results for May YTD are as follows:

- Income Actual \$173,503, Budget \$182,558
- Expenses Actual \$167,613, Budget \$168,517
- Net activity Actual \$5,890, Budget \$14,042



Actual net activity was below of budget by \$8,151. Pledged offerings are the primary reason for the difference. We are hopeful that we close the difference with summer worship services.

Church Directory – There is interest in coordinating a new congregational photo directory. Lifetouch is no longer in business. We hope to have an estimate before the July Council meeting.

AED – Our AED is part of a recall. The motion was made to trade in our current AED and purchase a new one. Carter moved, Aaron seconded, motion passed.

General Updates

Car Show has 14 entries.

AA is considering a return to Grace Lutheran Church, and may begin to meet here as soon as August 1<sup>st</sup>.

There are beginning plans for the development of a Mission Reserve fund at Grace that would allow us to respond to needs quickly.
