#### **Notes from Rich**

Last month, Notes from Rich described the basic steps required to tune musical instruments with an emphasis on the pipe organ. The relationship between pitch and length of the air pathway through an instrument was described. The concept of the inverse relationship between frequency (pitch) and wavelength was established, and the mathematical relationship between frequency, wavelength, and the speed of sound was defined. This issue of Notes will describe the process that an organ technician goes through to tune a pipe organ.



As an analogy to tuning the pipe organ, imagine that one is waiting for begin a concert. A few minutes before the start of the concert, the oboist will play a single note which should match the pitch of the A above middle C, often referred to A440. All of the other players will listen to that note and then play that note on their instrument to see if the tones match. If a musician determines that his/her instrument does not match the pitch of the oboe, adjustments to the length of the instrument (longer to lower the pitch; shorter to raise the pitch) will be made until the notes match in pitch. After all the musicians are satisfied that they are playing the same note, the concert can begin. Once the A above middle C is established for each instrument, the construction of the individual instruments and the skill of the musician will assure that all of the other notes played by that instrument will be in tune. (Note: This discussion applies to wind-blown instruments such as the brass and woodwinds. String instruments are tuned by changing the tension on the strings, and all four strings on those instruments are tuned independently.) The tuning process takes but a small portion of a minute for skilled performers.

A reasonable question could be raised at this point: How does a musician know when the instrument is in tune? In other words, what has to happen to know that two instruments are playing the same pitch? Musicians use an acoustic phenomenon called beating to aid in tuning. When two notes, played simultaneously, differ by less than a quarter of a step, they will clash producing a dissonant sound. As the two notes are brought closer to agreement by adjusting the pitch of one of them, the dissonance will become a wavering (or beating) similar to the vibrato in a trained singer's voice. As the two notes approach the same pitch, the beating will slow down and eventually disappear when the notes exactly match. Then two instruments producing the two notes are considered to be in tune.

Tuning the pipe organ takes longer than tuning the orchestra because each of the pipes in the organ is essentially a separate instrument and must be tuned one at a time. Once the A pipe above middle C is tuned by comparing its sound to a source of A440 sound, the rest of the notes within the octave that contains the A above middle C are tuned. (This process is beyond the scope of this paper.) After the pitches of the middle of the first rank are established, the rest of the pipes in that rank (61 for the manuals, 32 for the pedals) are tuned by adjusting notes an octave above and below the reference pipes until there are no beats when the two pipes are played together. This tuning by comparison of octaves is repeated for all of the ranks of the organ.

There are two exceptions to this process. For reed pipes, the length of the pipe is not adjusted; rather the length of the vibrating reed within the boot of the pipe is adjusted using a small bent wire that sticks up from the boot. A longer reed lowers the pitch; a shorter reed raises the pitch. The Grace organ has three reed ranks. A second exception involves the tuning of the celeste pipes. The celeste rank is manufactured to be almost identical to either a flute rank or a string rank. But, the celeste rank is tuned slightly sharp compared to its paired flute or string rank. The resulting sound when both ranks are played is one that beats or wavers about one to two times per second. To the listener's ear, the sound is pleasant and soothing.

Tuning the pipe organ generally requires two people: one next to the pipes to listen and adjust the pipes and a second sitting at the console and holding the keys down. Each of the roughly 1,300 pipes **Notes, continued on page 6**

Grace organ is checked and adjusted (if necessary) when the organ is tuned. Usually this is done twice per year at a time when the temperature within the sanctuary and pipe chambers is easily controlled and consistent.

**The day of the event:** Teams of volunteers will work together to build shelves in the backstock room, shop together for additional items, organize the items in the backstock pantry, cook a meal, and more! We will worship outside at 9 a.m., get to work, then re-gather outside for fun and food.

**After the event:** Continue to bring in non-perishable and financial donations for the food pantry. Volunteers and ministry teams are encouraged to sign up for a weekly slot to swing by Grace to restock the Little Food Pantry.

"I like helping D. and seeing her progress and growth in her daily living," Anita says. "When you and the person in your care begin living like a family, when they are able to trust you and open up, then you know you're getting somewhere."

Financial results for July YTD are as follows:


- Income Actual \$231,759, Budget \$253,542

- Net activity Actual \$(2,703), Budget \$11,825




Actual net activity was below of budget by \$14,528. Pledged offerings are the primary reason for the difference. Pledged offerings are below budget by \$20,751, which is an increase of \$4,732 from the previous month. This variance is offset by several expense categories that are below budget.
