Minutes of Annual Congregational Meeting January 30, 2022

Held via Zoom Teleconferencing Application

After a quorum was established, the meeting was called to order by Congregational Council President John Roehrick at 10:04 AM. Some brief guidance was given concerning how to participate in a remote meeting.

Devotions: Pastor Mike Schmidt led the assembly in devotions.

Attention was directed to the Opening Liturgy and the message from Bishop Eaton.

Rich Snyder was appointed Parliamentarian.

The agenda was adopted by absence of objection with the addition of one item: discussion and vote whether to approve Grace Lutheran Church as an intern site.

President John Roehrick directed the attendees to review the statistical information presented on pages 2 and 3 of the annual report.

It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes of the 2021 Annual Congregational Meeting as printed.

Reports:

- President's and Pastor's Reports: President Roehrick directed the participants to review the Congregational Council President's report and the Pastor's report. Both reports noted the difficulties faced this past year. Both also commended the Congregation for continued spiritual and financial support during the ongoing pandemic. Staff and the technicians who kept us "on the air" also received recognition and thanks. There were no questions, and the reports were approved as written by unanimous consent.
- Staff Reports: The participants were directed to review the Staff reports. There were no questions, and the reports were approved as written by unanimous consent.
- Committee Reports: The participants were directed to review the various committee reports. There were no questions, and the reports were approved as written by unanimous consent.

Discussion and vote to approve Grace Lutheran Church as an intern site: Pastor Mike explained the process of applying and setting up the church as an intern site. After discussion and some questions, it was moved and seconded to approve Grace Lutheran Church as an intern site. The motion was approved by absence of objection.

Elections:

- Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly 2022: Jessica Flannery volunteered and was approved to be one of two voting members for the Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly. The Congregational Council will appoint the second member.
- Congregational Council: The following members were elected by absence of objection to 3-year terms on the Congregational Council: Kevin Drury, Mike Hilsabeck, Jenny Rehder, and Carter Woodruff.
- Endowment Committee: Kristin Medhurst and Eric Weber were elected by absence of objection to serve as members of the Endowment Committee.

Balance Sheets, Income Statements, and Budget Adoption:

- Kevin Krause presented and explained the balance sheet and income statement and directed attention to the Finance Committee Report on page 21 of the annual report. The financial condition is good, due in part to PPP money, some large personal contributions, and the generous response of the members of the Congregation to the Stewardship Campaign.
- Kevin presented the proposed budget for 2022 as recommended by the Congregational Council. It was moved and seconded to approve the 2022 budget as presented. The motion carried by voice vote and the 2022 budget stands approved and adopted.

There being no further business a motion to adjourn was approved without objection. Meeting was adjourned at 10:55 AM.

2022 has been quite a year. Our Little Free Pantry has made and continues to make a significant impact on the needs of people in our neighborhood. We welcomed a new intern, Bunny Stoutes, who has managed to keep us smiling even in those tough moments. We even had our first Grace Golf Outing in over a decade!

Financially, we are in great shape. The amount of support we received from the congregation was greater than we expected, and expenses were less than expected. On top of that, we were able to arrange significant upgrades to our HVAC system. This does not mean, however, that we can ease off in our stewardship moving forward. We must continue to support the church vigorously as energy prices (and the cost of everything else) have increased significantly. We are also planning another campaign for upgrades to many areas of our building. This is critical as our building will be open to use by more outside groups than at any time since early 2000.

The Council of 2023 will have many things to consider, including upgrades to computers for staff, updating our membership rolls for a new directory, and continuing the journey toward more fully welcoming people of all races, orientations, and identities.

A big thank you goes out to all members of staff, council, committees, small groups, and everyone who has volunteered their time, talents, and resources.

Pastor's Report 2022 - Pastor Michael Schmidt

"I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you." Philippians 1:3-4

I want to begin by offering thanks. At the Annual Meeting twelve years ago, you took a vote to call me as pastor, and my life has been forever changed by our time together. We have been through a lot of highs and lows together. This year marks some of the highest highs and lowest lows, as we were able to celebrate Easter and Christmas together and have also gathered in celebration of many lives well lived. We have enjoyed being an Internship Host Site, working with Vicar Bunny, while also facing the reality that ministries such as Grace Kids Care will not return. Highs and lows mark the year, yet I still pray in thanksgiving and joy for the opportunity to serve here and walk with you as the people of God at Grace Lutheran Church.

This year has been home to some wins, and I want to take time to acknowledge those.

- We were able to return to in person worship and have watched in person attendance steadily grow throughout the year.
- We were able to resume education for all ages. There is a dedicated team of volunteers working with our school aged youth and middle and high school students. Adult education has resumed on Sunday and Tuesday mornings.
- Our Little Free Pantry project has grown considerably. We were able to create a back-stock space and have received grants for supplies. This is largely due to the work of Vicar Bunny.
- The Music Ministry is once again a vital part of worship. It has been a joy to hear the Choir, Bells, and Brass in person once again.
- December 18th was a wonderful community wide celebration through the Christmas Program and dessert potluck. We were also gifted by the presence of Bishop Amy Current. This is the first time since June of 2017 that we were able to welcome someone from the Office of the Bishop in the Southeastern Iowa Synod.
- A generous anonymous gift has led to the start of the Mission Action Fund. This fund is to be used in outreach with the goal of being spent down each year. We currently have \$22,145 with which we can make an impact in the world in the name of Christ. Thanks be to God.
- It was a strong year financially. We were able to finish the year with a surplus of more than \$30,000! Thank you!

These are just a few of the accomplishments this past year. These accomplishments listed together give a glimpse of what is possible here at Grace Lutheran Church. As we celebrate these wins, we also look forward to what is coming this year.

- This year during Lent we will dive into the theme of "Seeking." The worship services will have a similar feel to the format used during Advent. We will dive into a series of question that deal with the inner work of faith. It will be a time for all of us to grow in faith.
- The Council voted to embark on a journey of congregational study through the Reconciling in Christ process. The goal is to create a safe space for us to enter discussion and education of sexuality and race. The life of Jesus was one of radical hospitality. We hope to learn together how to welcome like Christ.
- We hope to continue the journey as an Internship Host Site. This is such a great opportunity to learn and teach as a community of faith.
- As space in our lower level is cleaned out and prepared for occupancy, we can explore potential partnerships with other groups and agencies. In a time where many agencies are reducing their "bricks and mortar" footprint, there is an increased need to such partnerships. It is exciting to see where this will lead.

It is such a joy to journey with you, and I look forward to seeing where the Holy Spirit guides us together. This is such an amazing community of faith, and that is all because of you.

Intern Report 2022 by Vicar Bunny Stoutes

It seems like a distant memory – March 16, 2022. This day students gathered at Wartburg Castle and Zoomed with online students while waiting for our intern assignments. We paced. We acted like we were paying attention in class, but most of us were not. Then it came at 2:41pm – I was assigned to Grace Lutheran Church in Des Moines. A letter from Pastor Mike with a description of the congregation was attached to the email. Words stuck out to me – especially the opening words, "One can expect to be welcomed. This community of faith has a rich history of welcoming all as fellow siblings in Christ." Other keywords stood out to me: siblings, worship, community, opportunities. All words that gave me an inkling to the health of the congregation in very positive ways. In practice I've found these to be true, yet a small snapshot of the many wonderful things that makes the people of Grace unique and special.

One of the scariest moments was reading that Grace was a new intern site, and Pastor Mike would be a firsttime supervisor. Who would I call to get the scoop? What was the congregation really like, besides on paper? What are the living accommodations like? Talk about a leap of faith – for both of us. Grace applied for an intern with no say on who you would receive. That had to be a bit scary too. We all placed our faith in the people who make the matches; they pray, they talk with interns and the committees, and then they pray more.

I'm grateful we both took this leap of faith. To be gifted with a supervisor who has a goal of helping me to see my God given gifts in a pastoral role is a blessing. To be greeted by a congregation that understands that my purpose here is to "become" and nurture my soul while being open to let me learn is a precious gift. We have also found the learning has been reciprocal – I am learning tons from the congregation, council, staff, & supervisor, and I'm also able to share insights with each group of people as well.

One of the teams I work closely with is the internship committee. These faithful volunteers meet with me offsite once a month. On paper, the biggest task of the committee is completing the 6- and 12-month evaluation forms. But in reality, having a core team of people that are there to ensure I personally and professionally thrive is an added bonus! It's a low time commitment/high impact ministry – please consider saying yes to serve this way if asked to serve for future interns!

As I move forward in my final five months of internship, there are a few things I need to check off my "list" of things I came in wanting to learn. These include attending finance meetings, continue work with my confidence, preaching regularly, and learning what to look for as I move forward with my first call.

In thinking about embracing your next intern – I offer this insight: They will be different. They will come with different experience levels, different backgrounds, with different gifts. They will need to work on different aspects of their growth. There is one statement that I beg you never say. "But Vicar XXX did it that way." There is no comparison. Our learning goals are personalized and what following interns need for growth will not be the same as mine. Give them the same gifts you gave me – a soft place to land, time to form relationships and trust, hospitality, honesty, and love.

Internship has been a rewarding experience for me on many levels. As I go out into the world and take my first call, second call, work with the synods, and more, I will be forever changed by the lessons learned here at Grace. The potential people I encounter will be limitless. By taking this leap of faith, the people of Grace have the potential to catapult new leadership for the ELCA and the world. I can't thank you enough.

- **Facebook** Morning Prayer twice a week, worship services broadcast and archived. Advertising Grace events. The private page Abiding Grace continues to be a low use space but is a good location for discussions and sharing of information.
- Post Cards/Mailings to the membership & neighborhood as needed
- Worship Materials printed, published online, and mailed.
- **Membership Mailings**: we continue to mail monthly newsletters and weekly bulletin/announcement/sermon to those who request it. This list has shortened considerably in the past year, some sadly due to losses, and some thankfully as members have been able to return to inhouse worship. Anyone who would like to be added to this this for any reason need only ask.

Children & Youth Education

The school year began with a realistic look at the volunteer capacity for the children & youth education hour each Sunday. Emily Stowell and Deanna Weber took the lead of the K-5 group. This group was moved to the main floor to be closer to the other activities taking place during this hour. The Spark All Kids curriculum from Sparkhouse was used, allowing leaders to flex as necessary with age appropriate lessons for small groups. The curriculum offers lessons for older kids and younger kids and it is based on the same lectionary that is used in worship. Leadership is currently looking at ways to engage more adult volunteers to expand the class in hopes of creating a small group for our preschool students who are currently attending.

Jenie Schmidt, Courtney Brandsfield, and Jessye Flannery took the lead of the 6th-12th grade class. There was a strong desire from our youth to craft their own program with an emphasis on service this year. Their main goals include learning how the life of the church has a place in their daily lives and developing relationships with each other. Our leaders work with the youth to help them form practical goals and accompany them as they learn and grow from a place of grace and love. The youth planned and pulled off a service project with Meals from the Heartland and adopted three families from Moore Elementary. In December, they shopped together for the families, wrapped gifts together, and enjoyed fellowship while being entertained with a movie.

For the spring semester, the 6th-12th grade students plan on creating a liturgical dance to be performed during worship in April as a part of their many activities.

Both groups have implemented a new volunteer system to ensure a second adult is in the classroom for all events for the safety of the children, youth and adult volunteers. A sign-up board is in the Gathering Hall and volunteers sign up to be a "second" in each classroom, where no pre-planning is involved to make it easy for all members of the congregation to help support our kids.

All the youth participated in a musical Christmas program. Some volunteered to sing, some helped with the tech crew, others were "Angel Herders," and more! Many thanks to Denise, Emma, and all the volunteers for their work on the program this year.

Confirmation is co-taught by Pastor Mike and Vicar Bunny in a "retreat" style format using the Colaborate lessons from Sparkhouse. The group spends one Sunday a month learning about the New Testament, including maps, the life of Jesus Christ, learned about other events that took place during the same timeframe, and they have an understanding of the first four books of the Bible. During the spring, the confirmands will dive into the books written by Paul, the history of the early church, and end the year with a study on the book of Revelation. Three lessons are taught each session with a meal, relationship building, and deep listening to our youth from their leaders.

Outreach in 2022

Little Free Pantry (LFP)

The Little Free Pantry (LFP) program was expanded this year as a part of God's Work Our Hands day in September. As a lead up to the event, Kevin Drury was asked to be the lead volunteer recruiter, and successfully set up leads for a congregational meal, food handlers & organizers, shoppers, shelf builders, and more. On the day of the event, we celebrated worship outside in the parking lot, then teams got straight to work setting up room 105 as a new backstock room for food that was collected in the weeks leading up to the event. Craft supplies were moved from the room, shelves were built, then food and toiletries were brought in and organized. After the room was complete, we ate grilled hamburgers together and enjoyed fellowship.

As a part of the changes to the LFP, it is stocked from the backstock room twelve times a week by several volunteers. These volunteers handle incoming products, rotate stock, and maintain cleanliness of the LFP. We ask for different food items to be brought in each week by the congregation, advertise an Amazon wish list, and use funds given by the congregation to purchase food as needed.

In December, we received a \$6,000 grant from Immanuel Vision Foundation for the purchase of groceries, supplies, and advertising to help sustain the project. Vicar Bunny is working on turning over final responsibilities of the pantry. Small jobs to turn over include: Amazon wish list curator, food ordering, grant finder, and a general communicator.

Report from Cradle Roll

The Cradle Roll program ministers to parents with children between the ages of birth through age three.

"Splash!" materials from Augsburg Fortress are used. Each month the parents receive a "Parent Page" appropriate for the age of their child. A music CD is included with the first parent page and again for the child's 1st and 2nd birthdays. The materials are supplemented with additional materials at Christmas, Easter, and the child's third birthday.

There are currently fifteen children enrolled in the Grace Cradle Roll.

Three children enrolled in the program were baptized during 2022. At the time of baptism, the parents are presented with a bible for their child. A dove with the child's name and baptismal date is added to the Baptismal Roll in the sanctuary. The dove is sent to the parents prior to the first anniversary of their child's baptism. The bibles were purchased with funds received from the Grace Endowment Fund. The doves and baptismal napkins were made and donated by Len and Helen Ringgenberg in memory of their grandson, Alec Freese.

Expenses include "Splash!" materials, postage, mailing and supplemental materials.

Report from the Grace Garden Committee

We welcomed two new gardeners to the group – Linda Gronert and Loree Nelson

Each year after we decide what we will grow – based on previous years' successes and struggles – each person signs up to contribute specific seeds and plants. Planting and cleanup are a group effort, while other crops are planted as appropriate.

Gardeners take care of the garden using a rotating schedule. This year each took one week out of every four, while Loree and Linda chose to work with/help other gardeners to learn how things work. We also provide help to each other during weeks of heavy harvest or watering needs. If you are looking for a way to do a little bit (or a lot) of gardening let us know.

Budget. We did not use most of our budget this year. While our compost bins currently provide enough to top off one or two of the long-raised beds every year, we wanted to amend all beds at the end of the season. A late summer fire at the local compost facility meant a shortage of loose compost, and an increase in price for bagged compost. Instead, we used part of our budget to repair/replace one of the small, older raised beds that was falling apart. Tim and Loree Nelson purchased the materials and made the repairs. Compost will be purchased in 2023.

Produce is delivered to local food pantries. Produce placed in the Little Free Pantry during/after each weeks' harvest is picked up almost immediately and is much appreciated.

We grew peas, okra, broccoli, sweet potatoes, Swiss Chard, tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, beans, pole beans, turnips, kohlrabi, beets, carrots, radishes, tomatillos, white and purple eggplant, and onions. Zucchini and squash harvests were small, and with a presence of squash bugs, we will likely break from growing these for a time.

Grace Lutheran Church has a Columbarium in the Prayer Chapel. Grace's Columbarium is a forty-eight companion Garden Niche Columbarium that accommodates a maximum of ninety-six cremation urns. The purchase price of each niche is \$1,200.

It has always been the obligation of the church to serve its congregation from baptism to death. Although earth burial on church grounds is not feasible at Grace, the desire to continue this sacred rite remains for some members.

The Columbarium at Grace allows us to revive the crucial ministry of offering a rightful place at the church for those who have come before us. It also comforts the living with the knowledge that we too will be welcomed home to the church.

Report of the Endowment Committee

The purpose of the Grace Lutheran Church Endowment Fund is to promote faithful Christian stewardship by providing a congregational plan to receive grants, gifts or bequest of money to be used to enhance the total program and mission of the Church beyond that supported through regular giving and apart from the general operation of the congregation. The Endowment Fund Committee acts as custodian of the Fund.

The Endowment Committee approved the following distributions of 2021 income, which was distributed in March of 2022.

Awards to Grace Lutheran Church:

- \$5,000 for Sidewalks and Landscaping for the Sexton House
- \$380 for a Technology Cart and Racks

Other Awards:

- \$2,500 to Lutheran Services in Iowa for Global Greens
- \$2,500 to Nutrition 4 Young Children for Healthy Baby Showers

A total of \$10,380 was awarded. Requests for grants totaled \$10,380. Since inception, the Endowment fund has awarded a total of **\$359,963** to **195** projects.

Report of the Finance Committee

The Church results were above budget in 2022. Overall, a surplus of \$30,389 was achieved as compared to a surplus budget of \$5,000. This positive variance was equally due to income above budget and expenses under budget.

Highlights of actual activity include the following:

- Pledged and unpledged offerings were above the prior year and budget.
- Overall, expenses were below budget. This was primarily due to lower costs for the intern position and utilities offset by higher insurance, internet/web and office equipment.

Budgeted activity for 2023 reflects a deficit of \$12,000. Highlights include the following:

- Pledged offering activity is below 2022 actual activity and pledging units are down.
- Pledged offerings are based on the actual pledge cards received and not historical results.
- Unpledged offerings are based on historical results and considers the transfer of activity to pledged offerings.
- Budget for 2023 includes the intern pastor position for the full year.
- Total staffing costs are approximately \$256,000 and represent 57% of the total operational costs of the Church.
- The budget for the professional leadership positions includes salary, employer taxes, pension and medical insurance.
- Synod Benevolence is unchanged from 2022.
- All other expense activity is comparable to the prior year.
- The activity for debt service reflects interest only on the debt to the Endowment Fund. This \$255,000 debt has an interest rate of 3%.

While a deficit budget is not an ideal presentation, the offerings budgeted is conservative and the past two years of strong results would be able to fund this shortfall.

Not included in the presented results is the activity of the Capital Campaign.

- During 2021, \$12,100 was received from members and \$84,916 from the Daycare closure, \$32,584 was spent on furnace replacements.
- During 2022, \$15,400 was received from members and \$20,676 was spent on lights for the sanctuary.
- Since Inception, \$173,341 has been received and \$112,580 spent on building improvements.
