# Minutes of Annual Congregational Meeting January 30, 2023

Call to Order –Alex called the meeting to order at 10:27 AM.

Devotions by Pastor Mike Hebrews 13:16. Opening Liturgy

Rich Snyder was appointed Parliamentarian.

Adoption of Agenda approved by absence of objection.

Statistical Information provided in the written report.

Minutes from 2022 Annual Meeting approved by absence of objection.

Council President's Report, Pastor's Report, Staff Reports, and Committee Reports were approved by absence of objection.

Election of voting members for 2023 SE IA Synod Assembly May 15-16; format is virtual, no travel required. Nominees Carter Woodruff and Jenny Rehder. Approved by absence of objection.

Election of Council Members & Endowment Committee Members

Nominees for council (3-yr terms): Greg Boeschen and Val Culp (second term). Approved by absence of objection. Council will have 10 members for 2023. Jenny moved that the next iteration of council discuss the reduction of council members that requires a change to the Constitution and Bylaws. Motion approved by absence of objection.

Endowment committee nominees Bruce Bergman and Kari Dostalik, approved by absence of objection.

Balance Sheet and Income Statement Review – Kevin Krause presented balance sheet and financials.

Noted the \$71K unrealized gain (loss) in the Endowment Fund due to the volatile stock market.

Ended 2022 with a surplus mostly due to increase in unpledged money and decrease in expenses. However, insurance costs are increasing so will continue to monitor this cost.

Clarifying question about the Mission Action Fund; restricted fund with its own account. More information coming in the next newsletter.

Largest increases for 2023; funding intern for full 12 months, property expenses, staff.

Budget Adoption – Kevin Krause presented the proposed budget as recommended by the Congregational Council. Motion made to approve the budget as presented, seconded, and passed by voice vote.

Presentation about Service Project for LSI. Collected household items for new LSI clients in the Refugee Resettlement Project. Blessing Prayer.

# **Council President's Report**

In preparing this report, it occurred to me that I should go back and read some of my predecessors' reports. It seems that they all started with something like - "this being an *unusual unprecedented, interesting, difficult, or quite* the year".

This year has been no different. I would like to thank those who served before me. 2023 presented many challenges; The year began with multiple roof leaks that caused damage inside the building. Because of the expenses that were above budget and pledges being under budget, we were seeing a deficit of \$60,000 by mid-year. This number was down to \$32,000 November. Even with expenses being as high as they were, members stepped up to catch up pledges for the year and we made budget.

We will eventually need to address replacement of the roof. Hopefully, the giving will be such that we can start to build some reserves into future budgets.

We were faced with the difficult but necessary decision of using reserves to replace our air conditioning units on the east side of the sanctuary. The replacement cost was \$80,000, we were roughly \$20,000 short and asked the congregation to contribute to a special campaign. The congregation stepped up to the challenge and we raised this money in short order. We have our second intern in as many years and are budgeting for a 3<sup>rd</sup> in 2024. Thank you to Vicar Adam and Pastor Mike for your leadership and spiritual guidance.

We started the year with the goal of updating our constitution and bylaws. The constitution has been updated and submitted to the synod. Unfortunately, the draft was sent back to us as we were told that the constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions need to be submitted together. Hopefully we will have this completed and voted on by the congregation by the next congregational meeting.

A photo wall and directory were completed in 2023. Thank you to council person Greg Boeschen and everyone involved. It is good to be able to put faces with names, especially for our new members.

We started a revenue task force to address what will be an eventual shortfall if we continue to do things the way we always have. This means looking for alternative revenue streams. This team has worked very hard to look at other revenue streams as our average giving per member is higher than at any time in memory. We will hopefully see some of those discussions come to fruition in 2024.

With 2023 in the rear window and we look forward to 2024, I am so thankful for our members' generosity and willingness to serve. I'd like to thank the congregation for allowing me to serve.

# Pastor's Report 2023 - Pastor Michael Schmidt

Then Joab said to a Cushite, "Go, tell the king what you have seen." The Cushite bowed down before Joab and ran off. Ahimaaz son of Zadok again said to Joab, "Come what may, please let me run behind the Cushite." But Joab replied, "My son, why do you want to go? You don't have any news that will bring you a reward." He said, "Come what may, I will run." So Joab said, "Run!" Then Ahimaaz ran by way of the plain and outran the Cushite. 2 Samuel 18:21-23

The year was marked with loss, as we gathered for nearly twenty funerals. The emotional toll that took on the community of faith, and on me, was considerable. Grief is ever present. In addition, there were the "goodbyes" that were said within the congregational staff. Vicar Bunny departed for Wartburg Seminary, with Emma Stammer close behind to make room for an increased role within the Johnston Community Schools Vocal Music Department. This fall, Denise Friesth retired in order to spend more time in the role of Grandmother. Each of these took a toll as well.

We also had a difficult year financially. We started the year behind budget. At one point we were at a \$60,000 deficit on the year. It was not until the incredible generosity shown in December that we made budget for the year. It was still a deficit on the year, but we came in ahead of the budgeted deficit. That was stunning, and I continue to be amazed at the generosity of this community of faith.

In the last three months of 2023, I received a great deal of unsolicited affirmation in both my call to serve Grace Lutheran Church and my gifts as a pastor. I cannot begin to express how thankful I am for these conversations, and the show of support on Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I ended 2023 with a renewed sense of calling to Grace Lutheran Church. This is truly an amazing community of faith, and I thank God every day for the honor of serving here.

The quote from 2 Samuel 18 hangs on the wall in my office, "Come what may, I will run." It is one of my favorite passages in the entire Bible. Ahimaaz desires to run and share the news of Absolom's death with King David. He is reminded that there is nothing to gain personally from this. The king will not be happy and likely angry with the messenger. It is the care and compassion of Ahimaaz that compels him to proclaim, "Come what may, I will run." His sincere witness impacted the message and the way that it was heard by King David.

We live in a time and place where the message of the Christian Church is often seen with suspicion. There are many who do not feel welcome, who do not trust the message, and who respond with anger toward the messenger. I may not be a runner, but in the words of Ahimaaz, "Come what may, I want to run."

We have a message of love to share with the world. We have a gift as a community of faith to be welcoming, to break down barriers, and to make a difference. May the world around us hear the message of God's love because our care and compassion is easily seen.

Although the word "difficult" comes to mind, there is a message to share. Come what may, I will run.

This year has been one of significant changes with Worship and Music. Our longtime Minister for Worship and Music, Emma Stammer, resigned to allow more time for an increased roll within the Johnston Community Schools Vocal Music department. I am incredibly thankful for the opportunity to work with Emma for nearly nine years, and also for the care she took in making sure it would be a smooth transition. Documents were prepared to help guide hymn selection, worship planning, and the work with Grace Bells and the Chancel Choir.

The work that was part of the Minister for Worship and Music job description has been split up, in order to decrease budget expenses. Rich Snyder now facilitates music during worship on all but one Sunday per month. Kathy Bowermaster covers one Sunday each month.

Kathy Bowermaster has also agreed to lead the Chancel Choir. This started as a volunteer position and will move to a stipend position for 2024. The choir has grown this year and I am very thankful for Kathy's direction. She has also helped with Grace Bells for select services.

Hymn selection has been absorbed by Rich Snyder, Vicar Adam, and me. We have been meeting every couple of months to select hymns for upcoming services. This process has lead to an even greater appreciation for all of the work that Emma has done in recent years. Selecting hymns is a rather stressful process, knowing that most people have definite opinions on worship music.

We have started to increase the collaboration between the Altar Guild and the staff in planning for Seasons within the church year. This has been a welcome change, and I am thankful for the increased input and involvement.

# **Report from the Stewardship Committee**

The Stewardship Committee in conjunction with the Finance Committee set two goals for 2023. They were as follows:

Reach a budget goal of \$415,00 for 2024. This was a slight budget decrease from the 2023 budget of \$445,000. This was determined to be reachable primarily by staffing changes for 2024. This also allowed Grace to continue to participate in the internship program.

Have a higher percentage of our projected income represented by pledged offerings. In 2023, pledged offerings made up 82% (365,000 of 445,000) of anticipated revenue. In the last few years, unpledged offerings have made up a larger percent of our budgeted income. Unpledged offerings are revenue that is not as predictable as pledged offerings. This has made it increasingly difficult to manage the budget in the current year and develop a budget for the next year. We asked the congregation to pledge for 2024 what they felt they could reasonably commit to fulfilling in 2024.

So, how did we do....

Pledged offerings came in at \$393,854! With a 5% uncollectable allowance (for unpredictable occurrences in 2024), we have a solid \$375,000 pledged offerings number for 2024. This is an increase from \$365,000 in 2023 and represents 90% (375,000 of 415,000) of the proposed budget for 2024. This is a great job by the congregation! This also decreased our unpledged offerings from \$50,000 in the 2023 budget to \$20,000 in the 2024 budget. The remaining balance of the budget is made up of building rental and other miscellaneous income.

The Stewardship Committee would first like to thank the congregation for its response to the stewardship campaign...not only in pledged amounts but timeliness in getting pledges in. This is beyond helpful! Additional thanks go to the Finance Committee for its close coordination on the budgeting process. Both committees must work hand-in-hand to have a successful campaign.

You'll notice that this report has been focused on resources...no mention of time and talent. The committee would also like to thank anyone that has donated their time and talents to the church in the past year. Grace's mission is an important one, and it cannot happen without all members of the congregation working together and contributing their time and talents.

# Outreach in 2023

#### Little Free Pantry (LFP)

Tackling food insecurity is at the forefront of our outreach at Grace and much of what we do works toward the goal of ensuring no one goes hungry. In 2019, Grace Lutheran erected a Little Free Pantry on an outdoor site accessible 24/7 to help with the rising food insecurity in our surrounding area, where nearly 72% of students at Moore Elementary School qualify for free & reduced lunch.

Thanks to an Immanuel Vision Foundation grant, we were able to expand our Little Free Pantry in 2023. The Little Free Pantry backstock room is stocked monthly with shelf stable food and personal care items by two dedicated shoppers, Tammy Denton and Kari Dostalik. A team of 16 awesome volunteers then stock the Little Free Pantry with approximately 50 items 1-2 times a day. We have distributed approximately 28,500 shelf stable items through our Little Free Pantry in 2023, in addition to the items dropped off and placed directly into the pantry by the community!

# **Report from Cradle Roll**

The Cradle Roll program ministers to parents with children between the ages of birth through age three.

"Splash!" materials from Augsburg Fortress press are used. Each month the parents receive a "Parent Page" appropriate for the age of their child. A music CD is included with the first parent page and again at the child's 1st and 2nd birthdays. The materials are supplemented with additional materials at Christmas, Easter, and the child's third birthday.

There are currently eleven children enrolled in the Grace Cradle Roll. Due to the fact there are no longer Sunday School classes for three- and four-year olds, three of the eleven children have been held over and will receive supplemental materials at Easter and/or Christmas 2024.

Two children enrolled in the Cradle Roll program were baptized during 2023. At the time of baptism, the parents are presented with a bible for their child. A dove with the child's name and baptismal date is added to the Baptismal Roll in the sanctuary. The dove is sent to the parents prior to the first anniversary of their child's baptism. The bibles were purchased with funds received from the Grace Endowment Fund. The doves and baptismal napkins were made and donated by Len and Helen Ringgenberg in memory of their grandson, Alec Freese.

Expenses include "Splash!" materials, postage, mailing and supplemental materials.

# **Report from the Grace Garden Committee**

**We welcomed** several new gardeners who helped out in 2023: Tammy Denton, Rich Snyder, Ashley Ocken. Michelle Voelker took a hiatus for most of the season, and we had a few gardeners benched for the season due to injuries so the extra help was much appreciated. Marion Nehmer and Carla Peterman are retiring from the Grace Garden after many years of caring planting and harvests. Each year after we decide what we will grow – based on previous years' successes and struggles – each person signs up to contribute specific seeds and plants. Planting and cleanup are a group effort, while other crops are planted as appropriate. Gardeners rotate during the bulk of the season, typically harvesting and watering for one week out of every 4 and helping each other with harvests during the heavier tomato and bean crop season.

In 2023 Carla Peterman expertly scaled back our plans based on the help available at the beginning of the year, leaving 2 beds unplanted.

In 2024 we look to plant more peppers, eggplant, and other produce that can be harvested with less frequency, and will continue to scale back on beans and tomato plants. We have planted fewer and fewer rows of beans and fewer tomato plants over the years, yet our soil has been enhanced by the raised beds and years of compost, so the plants thrive and produce record amounts of produce to donate. Produce is donated to local Food Pantries in the surrounding community, while some is added to the Little Free Pantry.

**Improvements:** With the addition of the path leading to the Little Free Pantry, Chuck Denton added a water spigot in the garden to keep the hose from crossing the path. It has been a welcome addition and makes watering the garden easier. Since it has been a few years, we also added compost to each bed in late October.

**Budget:** We used all of our budget, some for plants and seeds, the majority for adding needed compost

The compost bins on site produce compost to top dress a few beds or fill the sweet potato plant bags each year, depending on the materials available. The bins were quite full and mixed at the end of 2023 so should provide top dressing for several beds in 2024.

Thank you for allowing us to make use of this space, and to share a passion for growing & a love of working in the soil, to continually learn, and to share friendships while helping others.

#### **Report from the Lutheran World Relief Team**

This was a year of both joyful celebration and deep sadness for the Lutheran World Relief Team and Grace Lutheran Church in 2023. It was joyful because we celebrated our 75th year of working together with LWR for people in need around the world! We also welcomed two new members of our team: Theresa Gerling and Lyne Wall. The year was sad because we said "goodbye for now" to two of our long-serving members, Gladys Peterson and Beth Flannery who passed away. Gladys made quilts for many years and was frequently seen at the ironing board. Beth served as an enthusiastic committee chair, as a quilter, kitmaker, and super shopper for a long time. We began making memorial quilts to place in the Grace Little Free Pantry this year to honor our beloved members who have gone on ahead.

After searching in the church archives, a historical display was placed in the Gathering Hall during our Spring LWR Drive to celebrate our 75 years of service. We were blessed to have a visit from LWR's Reverend Tim Krick, Manager, Congregational Engagement. Along with Vicar Bunny Stoutes, he lead worship on February 19, and gave a moving presentation about the work of LWR during the education hour, thanking us for our involvement. We made 233 personal care kits, 20 baby care kits, and tied 42 quilts together in the Spring. Members of the congregation donated \$1455 for kit and quilt making in the Spring. Spring expenses were \$1061.93.

We were honored to be featured in an article in LWR's Faith in Action newsletter in June. Another congregation-wide kitmaking and quilt tying event was held on September 24th. We created 203 school kits, 30 baby care kits and tied 39 quilts in the Fall. Since the congregation was having a mini capital campaign around the same time, we opted to request funds from Grace's Mission Action Fund instead of having another fundraiser. We were granted \$2000 toward quilt and kit making! We also received \$350 in other donations. Fall expenses were \$1403.14. We have begun purchasing batting to use in our quilts to make them lighter to ship, and more warm and cozy.

The year began with \$1357.64 in our reserve account and ended 2023 with \$2697.57 remaining.

This agrees with church records. We thank the congregation for all the generosity and support.

 Instances where a Grace member is involved in direct or indirect service to others by being engaged in a community or service activity. The intent here is to get Grace members actively involved in Grace's mission and to live a life differently through Christ.
Instances where a need exists outside of the Grace community. An example may be any time the Lutheran Disaster Response is mobilized for an emergency (statewide or nationally).

The Mission Action Fund team consists of Aaron Brandsfield, Kristin Medhurst, Don Schouten, and Pastor Mike. This team reviews applications for use of funds and looks for ways the fund can be used to support other agencies. # **Report of the Endowment Committee**

The purpose of the Grace Lutheran Church Endowment Fund is to promote faithful Christian stewardship by providing a congregational plan to receive grants, gifts or bequest of money to be used to enhance the total program and mission of the Church beyond that supported through regular giving and apart from the general operation of the congregation. The Endowment Fund Committee acts as custodian of the Fund.

The Endowment Committee approved the following distributions of 2022 income, which was distributed in March of 2023.

Awards to Grace Lutheran Church:

• \$3,475 for Walkway path for Food Pantry

Other Awards:

- \$2,380 to Lutheran Lakeside Camp for resealing of Jerusalem Cabin
- $\cdot$  \$2,500 to Another Child Foundation for Living Water Mission Network

A total of \$8,355 was awarded. Requests for grants totaled \$8,355.

Since inception, the Endowment fund has awarded a total of \$368,318 to 198 projects.

During the year the Committee reduced the interest rate on their loan to Grace Church to 0% for the calendar year 2023 to assist the Church's financial condition. This reduction will impact the Committee's ability to provide grants in the future until this income is resumed. It is expected that the rate will remain at 0% throughout 2024.

# **Report of the Finance Committee**

The Church results were above budget in 2023. Overall, a deficit of \$9,925 was achieved as compared to a deficit budget of \$12,000. This was a strong recovery from the large deficit position the Church was in during the summer and fall.

Highlights of actual activity include the following:

- Pledged and unpledged offerings were below the prior year and budget.
- Overall, expenses were below budget. This was primarily due to lower costs for utilities, debt service and staff turnover offset by higher insurance and maintenance.

Budgeted activity for 2024 reflects a break even budget. Highlights include the following:

- Pledged offering activity is above 2023 actual activity, pledging units are down but average giving is up.
- Pledged offerings are based on the actual pledge cards received and not historical results.
- Unpledged offerings are based on historical results and considers the transfer of activity to pledged offerings.
- Budget for 2024 includes the intern pastor position for the full year.
- The choir director position is not being replaced. The office administrator position was split into a finance and receptionist position for 2024.
- Total staffing costs are approximately \$226,000 and represent 54% of the total operational costs of the Church.
- The budget for the professional leadership positions includes salary, employer taxes, pension and medical insurance.
- Synod Benevolence is unchanged from 2023.
- Insurance and maintenance accounts were both increased \$5,000 to reflect the higher level of expected activity.
- All other expense activity is comparable to the prior year.
- There is no activity for debt service as the payment of interest was suspended for 2023 and 2024 due to the financial condition of the church.

Not included in these results is the activity of the Capital Campaign.

- During 2022, \$15,400 was received from members and \$20,676 was spent on lights for the sanctuary.
- During 2023, \$59,030 was received from members and an additional \$13,621 was spent on lights for the sanctuary, \$81,577 was spent on AC replacement.
- Since Inception (2020), \$232,371 has been received and \$207,778 spent primarily on building mechanical systems.
