Connections

Like many others, I dove into the world of Wordle during the pandemic. It is a simple game: guess the word within 6 tries. I started playing Wordle every day, and plan to continue until I guess the word on the first try. I watched as Samantha landed all five green squares on the first try and I may be a little jealous. But I digress...

Wordle is one of three puzzle games that I play every day, along with the daily Solitaire and another New York Times game called Connections. The puzzle consists of 16 random words that you must correctly split into 4 groups of 4. There is something that connects each group of 4 words. It may be characters from "The Muppets" or words where you can add a letter and they become the name of a fruit.

I find this daily puzzle to be captivating. At first glance, it looks like the most random collection of words. There are often tricks in there too, where you see different connections with three of the words, but not a fourth. Sometimes the answers are regional, as words used to describe some things are different. For example, think soda/pop/coke. Whether you can see the connection or not, it is there. If you make four mistakes, the answer will be revealed to you.

As I think about the puzzle game, I cannot help but think about Grace Lutheran Church. We are all different. We have differing skills and abilities, different temperaments, different appearances, neighborhoods, etc. We are all different, yet there is a connection between us all. We are connected through the love of God. We are a community of faith, centered in worship, held in grace, strengthened in love, and sent forth in mission.

If you took four of us randomly and placed us alongside 12 others, the connection may be difficult to see. That is the beauty of it. This community is not one based on outside appearances, or any other marker. It is a connection made possible through the love of God, and the community that has been built. We become a people. It may not be easily seen by others from the outside, yet we are connected.

Medical Debt Relief Campaign

The Mission Action Fund Team is partnering with RIP Medical Debt to relieve lowans of the burden of medical debt. Our goal is to lead the way on a campaign with other ELCA congregations in the Southeastern Iowa Synod. More than 100 million U.S. adults struggle with healthcare debt. There is more than \$195 billion owed nationwide. RIP Medical Debt has access to \$16 million of medical debt within the state of Iowa.

The Mission Action Fund has already allocated \$10,000 for this campaign. This will relieve \$1,000,000 worth of debt within Iowa.

How can I help?

We are raising money through the end of March. Any money raised in that time will be added to the \$10,000. We will use the funds raised as a challenge to other congregations within the Southeastern lowa Synod. Starting on April 1st, the campaign will go live on ripmedicaldebt.org and will continue until May 31st.

Please consider contributing. Donations can be made online, mailed to the church office, or placed with worship offerings. Please write checks to Grace Lutheran Church and include "Medical Debt Relief" in the memo field. Together, we can make a lasting impact for lowans struggling with medical debt.

Endowment Committee Update

The purpose of the Grace Lutheran Church Endowment Fund is to promote faithful Christian stewardship by providing a congregational plan to receive grants, gifts or bequest of money to be used to enhance the total program and mission of the Church beyond that supported through regular giving and apart from the general operation of the congregation. The Endowment Fund Committee acts as custodian of the Fund.

The Endowment Committee approved the following distributions of 2023 income, which was distributed in February.

- \$2,700 to **Grace Lutheran Church** for outdoor security cameras and to upgrade the interior security cameras and recording system.
- \$939.80 to Lutheran Services in Iowa for soundproof wall panels and sound machines to upgrade LSI's Polk County therapy rooms to help maintain client confidentiality and provide an atmosphere of comfort, warmth, and safety.
- \$1,998 to **Urban Bicycle Food Ministry** to purchase sleeping bags and/or crank radios for their homeless friends on the street.
- \$1,000 to **Mentor lowa** to sponsor the group's glow bowling event for at risk youth and their mentees in November.
- \$2,000 to **Des Moines Refugee Support** to fund transportation costs for sending 100 children to Camp Hantesa and the YMCA camp.

A total of \$8,637.80 was awarded. Requests for grants totaled \$24,780. Since inception, the Endowment fund has awarded a total of **\$376,955.80** to **203** projects.

From Sheep to Shepherd: An LSI Early Childhood Services Story

Amid the COVID-19 pandemic, a mother, recently released from treatment, found herself in her new empty apartment with her son. She felt lost and needed a shepherd to guide her. So, Hali contacted LSI's Early Childhood Services, and Gretchen O'Brien, a Family Support Worker, answered the call. Gretchen began



virtual home visits using the Healthy Family America home-visiting model.

For the next three years, Gretchen connected Hali and her son to community resources, served as a support system and a shoulder to cry on, and celebrated Hali's sobriety milestones with her. Even when Hali doubted herself, Gretchen guided and believed in her.

"I just remember sitting in that empty apartment crying, but I had Gretchen on the phone. You guys believed in me when nobody else did," shared Hali.

Today, Hali serves on the Healthy Family America (HFA) National Parent Advisory Committee, the first of its kind. The group is composed of 10-12 parents from around the country who have graduated from their local HFA program, each participant with their own story to share. Hali needed a shepherd in her time of trouble and self-doubt, and Gretchen answered that call. Now, Hali serves as a shepherd to thousands of parents through the National Parent Advisory Committee. The LSI Early Childhood team couldn't be more proud of Hali and Gretchen.

The Whisper of God

Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, "Let us be silent, that we may hear the whisper of God." Have you heard that whisper during the silence we've been sharing in worship? There seems to be something profound in holding moments of silence together, and when we do so with the intention of opening ourselves to the Presence of the Holy One we rightly call it prayer.



Yes, silence can be prayer, and an especially intimate way to be with God. Have you noticed how, when you are with someone you don't know well, silence can feel awkward and we may try to fill it with conversation? On the other hand, when we are with someone we know and trust we can be comfortable just being together. Simple presence can take on a depth of meaning that makes words unnecessary. It's that way with God too.

It is interesting to note that 'silent' and 'listen' contain the same letters. Howard Thurman, spiritual mentor to Martin Luther King Jr. and other Civil Rights leaders, wrote of the importance of 'centering down' and learning to listen in order to swing open the doors of our being to an experience of God. (https://cac.org/daily-meditations/alive-for-a-reason/)

The Being New team has been practicing this silent Centering Prayer together when we meet and we've appreciated your willingness to be with this practice during worship. If you are interested in exploring it further, opportunities abound.

These groups include both 20 minutes of silence as well as discussion.

Wisdom Waypoints groups: (wisdomwaypoints.org/event/wisdom-meditation-online-and-ongoing/) These larger groups meet for 30 minutes, with 20 minutes of silence. If you are getting started and think 20 minutes is just too much you can quietly leave the meeting early!

The Being New team will be hosting the **Adult Forum on April 21**. Come and meet us, hear our plans and ideas around Centering Prayer as well as other ways we can open ourselves to a closer, more personal relationship with God. And bring your questions...like the one everyone has starting out...'What do I do with all these thoughts!!??'

The Mission Action Fund was used to support several local entities during All-ages service project opportunities 2023. The All services projects have continued, beginning with the Book Drive for Little Free Libraries in January and February 2024, and the current Medical Debt Relief Campaign and challenge which can be found on page 3 of this publication.

End of year gifts were also given to several agencies at the end of 2023. One of those gifts was for **Lutheran Services in Iowa:**

Lutheran Services in Iowa is one of Iowa's largest Non-profit Human Services Agencies. In 2021 alone LSI provided 11,120 home visits for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers, 13,278 therapy sessions for children, families and adults, 6,144 behavioral health sessions with Iowa children and families, and empowered 603 Iowans through LSI services for people with disabilities.

More than 100 staff in the LSI Immigrant and Refugee Services has helped settle those displaced from Afghanistan and Ukraine.

LSI Global Greens program reconnects former refugee farmers with the land as they build their new life in the U.S. Through Global Greens, farmers access space to grow food, learn more about U.S. agriculture, and start their own business by selling produce at our Farmers' Market and in our CSA.

Other services include assisting with Foster Care, Adoption, Mental Health Services, Child Care, Education, and others. Explore LSI at <u>www.lsiowa.org</u>

Mission Action Fund The Fund will also Accept Donations.

Fund Goal: The goal of the Mission Action Fund is to be able to respond quickly to needs in the immediate neighborhood and beyond (statewide, nationally, and internationally), and not to be used for the Congregational Budget. This fund is ideally meant to be used in instances where a Grace member is involved in direct or indirect service to others by being engaged in a community or service activity, OR in instances where a need exists outside of the Grace community. The intent here is to get Grace members actively involved in Grace's mission and to live a life differently through Christ.



Eligibility for Funds:

- Local service organizations. Grace members may or may not be directly active in the organization. Organizations that serve the Merle Hay neighborhood would be ideal but not restricted to this geography.
- Service organizations (statewide, nationally or internationally) that service/help others in times of need or crisis.

Process to Apply: Copy these questions into an email, along with your answers and send to <u>mike@gracedm.org</u> An application needs to be approved by a majority of the Quick Response Team to be funded.
