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Re

I find myself thinking a lot of "re" words these days: reform, rebirth, renacimiento, renew, renaissance, remember, revolve, revolution, reformation, and so on. It is October, which is the time we celebrate the Reformation, and that is well and good. Yet, there is something deeper in the works.

At the Congregational Council meeting on September 24th, someone remarked, "It feels like we are in the middle of a rebirth at Grace." I agree. There is something tangible happening here. But I do not know what "re" word best describes it. There is a renewal of interest and volunteerism. There is a growing level of spirituality. There is a feeling of being re-formed as a community in Christ.

My first call was to Our Savior's and El Renacimiento Lutheran Churches in Sioux City. The "Our Savior's" name is easily understood. "El Renacimiento" simply means "rebirth." It was a Spanish-speaking worshipping community whose members were all looking for rebirth in the Midwest. After a couple of years, they asked if Our Savior's would welcome them as members if they dropped the name "El Renacimiento," remarking that most English-speaking people could not say it anyway. So, they joined Our Savior's and went by the Spanish equivalent Nuestro Salvador.

At the time, I thought it was a brilliant move, coming from within. What I have learned in the years since, is that it may have been better to build off of the English equivalent "Rebirth." That sums up the goal of faith, to be reformed, or transformed, through Christ.

We are in the midst of a "re" movement here at Grace. I do not know where this is leading, and maybe that is the most exciting part. This is not driven by a plan that was developed in some meeting. The Spirit is nudging in ways that we had not imagined before. There is something new and exciting happening, and I pray that you feel it too.

It is a humbling time to be walking with you as pastor and I look forward to seeing where this leads. I also hope to hear from you. If the Spirit seems to be nudging you, or you've had something on your mind (especially in connection with Grace), please reach out. I would love to hear from you.

Dear Friends of Grace Lutheran Church,





Fall 2024 Straight Talk On Finances

Heading into our Fall Stewardship Campaign, this letter is an update to the Congregation on how we are doing financially, and how this may impact the fall stewardship campaign. This is also the time to reflect upon Grace's mission for the next year and what is needed in terms of time, talent, and resources to fulfill the mission. To that end, the Grace Church Council and the Finance Committee have been closely reviewing Graces's financial position, historical trends, and needs/wants for 2025. Following is some background information to keep in mind as we move forward.

Background Information:

- 1. In last year's letter (2023) we discussed a year where Grace faced a significantly larger mid-year deficit (\$58,000) than compared to the previous several years (\$8,000 \$12,000). Historically, annual finances fall behind budget during the summer months but catch up in November and December. This deficit was giving the Church Council and Finance Committee some concern on what to expect for the full year 2023 financials. Thankfully, giving caught up by the year end and Grace again ended in a solid financial position (loss of \$10,000 vs. budgeted loss of \$12,000).
- 2. This year (2024), giving has tracked much closer to normal trends. This has been a welcome reprieve from the concerns of last year. We are approximately \$6,000 below budget and this includes unexpected maintenance costs of over \$30,000, which was offset by certain unbudgeted income. The need remains to finish the year strong because of ongoing maintenance needs and the desire to repay the Grace Endowment Loan.

Challenges Moving Forward:

- 1. During the ten-year period 2014 2024, giving units have decreased 45%; however, average pledging gift increased 82%. During this same timeframe operating revenue/expenses have decreased 10%. Grace has been able to maintain a relatively stable break-even budget primarily due to increased pledging levels by members. Additionally, certain full-time positions were eliminated or converted to part time/intern to be able to fund other operating costs that have increased such as insurance, maintenance and remaining staff expenses.
- 2. Budgeting depends on having accurate pledged income expectations and has become increasingly difficult in certain expense projections with recent inflation and unplanned maintenance. We have an older facility that has continual maintenance and upkeep needs. Two maintenance items that will need addressing in the next year are water problems in the basement and brick tuckpointing. It is a high priority to eliminate water coming into the building.
- 3. A capital campaign was planned to begin just before COVID. That sidelined the campaign but the needs remain. Several items have already been addressed in the last few years because of immediate need...updated boilers and air conditioners for the building. These were funded by specific mini capital campaigns. One large item that is on the radar is the need to reroof the building. This could cost up to \$200,000. The property committee is working on a list of needs and the priority of each.
- 4. A final comment, twenty-two percent (22%) of Grace's income comes from members that are 80 years of age and older. Seventy-five percent (75%) of our income comes from those members 60 and older. We are thankful for their generosity and commitment to Grace Lutheran Church. We need to increase other giving in order to build on their legacy.

How Are We Moving Ahead:

- 1. The Grace Church Council has resolved to communicate financial information fully with the congregation...this includes both good and not-so-good news. This is especially important as many needs identified pre-COVID have not gone away.
- 2. The Grace Church Council has created a Revenue Task Force. It has been tasked with taking stock of Continued on page 5

the church and its assets and determining if there are ways to develop a revenue stream for Grace beyond the traditional congregational offerings. An example of a new revenue stream is the renting of space for the Being New Spirituality Center. Another example is that excess cash reserves have been invested in a secure, higher interest-bearing accounts.

3. The Grace Church Council and the Finance Committee are currently working on the 2025 budget. Our goal is to be very specific with the congregation to let you know exactly what is needed in 2025 to fulfill Grace's mission.

Finance Report – August Results

Financial results for August YTD are as follows:

- Income Actual \$287,730, Budget \$276,050, Prior Year \$252,183
- Expenses Actual \$296,071, Budget \$311,950, Prior Year \$309,968
- Net activity Actual (\$8,341), Budget (\$2,967), Prior Year (\$57,785)



Activity is \$5K behind budget, but much better than last year. There was \$32K of unbudgeted roof repair work that was recently completed. Excluding this one-time expense, activity would be ahead of budget.

October in Worship

Each month we will be sharing upcoming texts, as well as all volunteer shifts still open at time of publication. We want to give everyone a chance to ponder the texts in advance – and for those signed up to lector, a chance to practice names of people and places! If you are contemplating being a lector, we encourage you to sign up online, at the clipboard in the Gathering Hall, or by calling the office.

October 6: Exodus 32:1-14

At the direction of Aaron, the Israelites turn over their gold to create a new god while Moses is up on the mountain. When God realizes what is going on in Moses's absence, God gets angry and decides to set God's wrath upon them. But Moses reminds God of words that were said earlier, and God changes God's mind.

October 13: 1 Samuel 1:9-11, 19-20; 2:1-10

God grants Hannah's prayer and she bears a son, Samuel, who will be an important figure in Israel's history. Hannah cannot believe that her request to have a child is granted with the birth of Samuel, so she praises God and thanks God for granting her prayer. Her praise is extravagant, but not at all undeserved.

October 20: 2 Samuel 7:1-17

Instead of David building a house (temple) for God, God promises to establish David's house (dynasty) forever. Centuries later, after the Babylonian exile, no king sat on the throne. Even then, however, the people of Israel remembered this promise and continued to hope for a king, the Messiah, God's anointed.

October 27: 1 Kings 5:1-5; 8:27-30, 41-43

Now is the time for the temple to be built, and Solomon shows us how to rightly understand the role of holy places and things in God's way of relating to us. The temple is not a limit on where God can be but a way to aid our trust that God is with us when we struggle to believe.



Worship Volunteers

Greeters: Be present in the entryway or Gathering Hall, smile, and welcome people! **Lectors**: Read the week's readings and Psalm from the Ambo. If you have issues with stairs we can work around that too – just ask! Please start with one Sunday per month, leaving opportunity for others who enjoy reading.

Communion assistants –Serve the wine or grape juice during communion. You may sit with your family before and after communion.

Coffee and Donut Servers; One or two people, or a family/group. Arrive before worship to start a pot of coffee in the Gathering Hall Kitchenette where you will find directions. Retrieve the box of donut holes from the kitchen. Start a carafe of decaf coffee brewing. After Communion head to the kitchenette, start a pot of hot water for tea, and set out the coffee, juice (found in the kitchenette fridge), cups, tea bags, donuts/tongs, and napkins. Socialize, refill any items if needed, clean up after any education offerings you would like to attend.

The Practice of the Presence of God

Brother Lawrence, a 16th century Carmelite monk, learned the secret of daily, moment by moment fellowship with God. A book, called *The Practice of the Presence of God*, is a collection of his writings, letters and conversations. From Brother Lawrence:

"God does not require a great deal of us; all God asks is a little remembrance from time to time, a little worship...We can make our heart a prayer room into which we can retire from time to time to converse with God gently, humbly and lovingly."



We trust in God's presence with us at all times and we only have to be attentive to that presence, even in our busiest of days. In the midst of whatever is swirling around us, we can simply pause momentarily, draw ourselves fully into the now and whisper a quiet 'I am here' and notice God's presence. Below are some ideas of times we can connect with God:

- Whether inside or outside, really look at the trees and envision their tremendous root systems that interconnect and communicate for their mutual good and feel gratitude for the Creator.
- Listen in silence as you walk or exercise. What sounds do you hear?
- Upon waking in the morning or even during the night, take five or more intentionally slow and deep breaths with awareness that you are breathing in Love and sending out Peace to the world with each exhale. Let it relax you into God's embrace.
- Before getting out of bed in the morning, smile and say "thank you" to the Creator, who will be with you all day.
- Invite Mary (we all have her) to join Martha (we all have her too) while doing household chores, blessing the very ordinary parts of your life.
 - o When doing the dishes, feeling your hands in the warm water
 - o When making the bed, praying for those who will sleep in it
 - o When folding laundry, grateful for clean clothes
 - o When vacuuming
- When blessing your meal, pause to ponder all it took to get that food on your plate...from the
 hands that prepared it back...to the grocery store workers, to those who transported or
 processed and packaged the food, to the farmers, and back to the Earth and the One who
 created it all.
- Approach Eurcharist with a sense of humility in the face of mystery, remembering the words of St Paul, "It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me." After receiving communion, you may want to pause at the altar rail, or touch your heart, or make the sign of the cross, or just take a conscious breath... in recognition of the grace in which we live and move and have our being.
- Smile with God when a favorite hymn or song runs through your mind.
- Give God a spiritual hug when you see a beautiful sunset.
- Bring yourself to the present moment, think of God and feel the Holy Spirit who is with you when you:
 - o Are standing in the shower feeling warm water flow over you

- o Hear the singing of a bird
- Happen to look up and see the sky, the moon
- o Before you make a call or compose a text, invite the Spirit into the conversation.
- o Before you make a call or compose a text, invite the Spirit into the conversation.
- While you are driving
- When you are sitting at a stop light
- Set an alarm periodically throughout the day to remind you that God is with you, by your side all
 of the time.
- Take time to sit quietly with God each day and listen.

Remember each day "God is with us now, and here, and always. We don't have to get God, to earn God. We have God already and always will." *The Monastic Heart*, Joan Chittister

When you take time to notice God's presence, you will start noticing God within you. "There is a voice within you that no one, not even you, has ever heard. Give yourself the opportunity of silence and begin to develop your listening in order to hear, deep within yourself, the music of your own spirit." *Anam Cara*, John O'Donohue
