One of my favorite authors is Dr. Kate Bowler, a professor at Duke Divinity School. Alongside her scholarship on the history of Christianity in North America, she has written two memoirs and several books of blessings and devotionals. In the most recent meeting of the Internship Committee, I shared one of her blessings: "A Blessing for Stretching Your Heart". Part of it goes like this:



"So bless me,
trying to live in between those two words:

yes ... and.
May I understand this is where the real work of life is found"

This is the season of the church year when I feel the tension of inbetweenness most deeply. We have passed Advent and Christmas but are not yet to Lent and Easter. We have celebrated Christ's birth and incarnation but his death and resurrection still loom.

TeamGRACE

We began as part of the Being New Committee assigned by the Congregational Council to study, pray, and seek the path of our church. At one point, we came to the realization there were at least two paths to address. The mission of TeamGRACE is to examine our congregational goals in our neighborhood and write a new mission statement with an attitude of Jesus. We read the Bible and other books to define what that means; we studied and prayed, and now, want to bring our congregation into the discussion of the possibilities.

We show our goals in our name: TeamGRACE
G – growing R – reconciling A – allying C – celebrating E – empowering

These Bible verses began our thinking:

Micah 6:8. He has told you, O mortal what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

Mark 12:29-33. When asked which was the first commandment, Jesus said, "The first is, 'Hear O Israel: the Lord, our God, the Lord is one, you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these. "The response was "this is more important than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices."

John 8:7 When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her."

These verses tell us justice, kindness, and humble behavior doing God's work clearly are our start; further instructions — love God, love your neighbor, love yourself — NOTHING is more important. Judging and harming others is just wrong.

Reconciling in Christ is a program for Lutheran communities that publicly welcome lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people. It is a way for faith communities to see, name, celebrate, and advocate for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions in the Lutheran church.

Siblings in Christ, this a congregational journey, led by TeamGRACE, to decide what shape our ministry will take. Reconciling in Christ is a process whereby a congregation decides how to become a welcoming and affirming congregation that accepts and supports all people — or not. It is a congregational decision, affirmed by a Lutheran organization, announcing that this congregation welcomes and supports all people.






Lutheran Day on the Hill Tuesday, March 11, 2025 9 a.m. – 3 p.m.

Sunday Text Summaries

If you are someone who likes to ponder the texts in advance, or if you are signed up to lector in the coming month, we've provided a short summary of each week's readings as well as the specific verses. If you are contemplating being a lector, we encourage you to sign up online, on the clipboard in the Gathering Hall, or by calling the office.

February 2: Luke 6:1-16

The Pharisees condemn Jesus and his disciples for "working" on the sabbath. Jesus points out that he, himself, is Lord of the Sabbath, not they. This is not well-received by the powers that be.

February 9: Luke 7:1-17

Jesus heals a Roman centurion's slave, then takes things up a notch and raises a man from the dead, so that his widowed mother might have a chance in life.

February 16: Luke 7:18-35

The people are wondering if things are ever going to change. John, not having an answer, sends men to ask Jesus for himself. Jesus reminds them of all he has already done and points out to those gathered that no matter how they go about things, someone will always find fault.

February 23: Luke 7:36-50

Jesus visits a Pharisee's house, and the Pharisee thinks nothing of it. But a woman, who everyone gathered knows is a sinner, cannot stop caring for Jesus's feet.

March 2: Luke 9:28-45

The conversation about Jesus' suffering and death is enclosed in a dazzling foreshadowing of the resurrection. God affirms Jesus' identity, the disciples are stunned speechless, and Jesus resumes his mission with a demonstration of his power over evil.

For those of you who look for Grace worship materials online, we've now moved everything onto the Bulletins Resource Page. Go to the website www.gracedm.org:

- Find the word <u>Resources</u>: On a laptop or desktop screen it is in the upper right-hand corner. If on your phone, click the 3 lines in the upper right corner; then find Resources, Give, and Volunteer at the bottom of the drop-down menu that appears.
- Once on the Resources page, look for the red bubble that says Bulletins, Announcements, Sermons. Click to open that page.
- Once you have the <u>Bulletins</u> page open, locate the date of the worship you are looking for. You can now open any of the bulleted links related to that date. You may read these online, download to your device, or print as you wish.

Videos currently remain available on a separate page in the Resources section here: Worship Videos. Each worship video is also posted to Facebook after the service. Sermons and worship videos are posted to the website approximately 24 hours after each worship. We tend to only keep between three and six months' worth of worship material and video links on our pages.

Sacred Gazing as a Spiritual Practice – Cindy Mackey

When the crowds demanding Jesus' attention grew, we read in Luke Chapter 5 that He would withdraw to deserted places to pray. Today our "deserted places" are the quiet spaces we must fashion in the midst of the everyday routine of our lives. Although nature can provide a wonderful setting for building our awareness of the Divine, as with Centering Prayer, Sacred Gazing can be done anywhere when we withdraw our attention from our thoughts and



from the activity around us. "If solitude is to be life-giving we must find our way through the labyrinth of our distractions right into the heart of God," Macrina Wiederkehr explains in A Tree Full of Angels.

Mystical experiences, as described previously in the Contemplative Corner, are prompted by things that cause a momentary letting go of one's self-identity to enter into a sense of being part of something larger. Such is the felt sense of Sacred Gazing.

Describing gazing as a form of prayer, Richard Rohr says, "Gazing without judgment, without analysis, without critique, is a form of prayer that lets things having no right to draw forth awe leave us awestruck. I experience this awe on my walking path through the trees, and from my window seat during the winter for example. Noticing the way the morning sunlight illuminates a simple flower or a light breeze caresses the trees, my simple awarenesses recognize and honor Nature as pure revelation of the Divine."

In the same way that daily Centering Prayer builds our spiritual muscle to focus only on God, gazing through softened eyes strengthens our ability to attend to the world *with the heart*. Cynthia Bourgeault says that this seeing with the eyes of the heart contributes to our sense of shared oneness. As such, Spiritual Gazing is a gift to ourselves AND also to the world, as we open our hearts to empathy, positive intent and gratitude.

In the words of author Victoria Loorz in <u>Church of the Wild</u>, 'We long to feel the presence of the Sacred with all of our senses and our emotions, and in that longing forget to look outside our window and engage in conversation with **a world that is already sacred**, just waiting for our attention.'

In the way that listening to music touches our hearts or sacred chanting vibrates in our core, Sacred Gazing with softened eyes allows us the space to be receptive and open to God in all of our surroundings.

We believe that contemplative insight and practice are key to the transformation of our spirits, touching that deep place of heart and of being that lives in each of us, whether we are part of a faith tradition or not.
