Green, White, and Purple

The time after Epiphany has clothed the altar and ambo with green. These "ordinary" times in the Church year are dressed in green to remind us of growth, whether in number or in depth. It is a time we focus on our response to the Good News. It is a beautiful time to focus on what God asks of us.

During these same weeks, the world has been focused on green. This focus has not been about growth, or response to the love of God. It has been about money. The news cycle is filled with stories of alleged fraud and waste of resources. At the time the Church is focused on service efforts to those in greatest needs, those in power have accused us of money laundering. Green was the color of the month, and not in the way we had hoped.

Transfiguration is clothed in white. It is a reminder of the way that the glory of the Christ was revealed on the mountaintop. This is the color for most of the major Church festivals. This color has also been misused in the last weeks. Just last weekend there was a white supremacy group that was marching in Des Moines, hurling chants of hate. There is no room for expressions of hate in the church, in the world, or in the home. God calls us to love. Period. Love of self, other, friend, family, enemy, all.

White, as a color, is the opposite of supremacy. White is created by combining all of the wavelengths together. That is how you get white. If white is supreme, it is only because it is about the radical inclusion of all. Speaking in terms of color, if any are excluded, it is no longer white. This is also true of how we see God. I believe it takes all of humanity to even begin to catch a glimpse of the expanse of God and God's love. All of us. No exceptions.

Lent is the time of purple. Symbolically, it is the color of repentance. This is not the feelings of guilt that ...

... we often imagine with the word "repentance." Instead, it is about turning and facing God. This is our work during this season. We are to focus on the commands that God has given us, to know the love of God, and to respond by sharing that love with others. This is done through sharing, through action, and through advocacy.

We live in a context that pits red against blue. How has that helped? What harm has it caused? It would do us well to remember that purple is also made in the mixing of red and blue. May the season of Lent be a time when we can work toward shades of purple. May we hold officials accountable. May we speak our truth. May we show love for those who disagree and pray for one another. We need purple.

Vicar's Voice — Happy March!

I can't believe Lent is already here. This is my favorite church season because of the quiet and contemplative nature of it. It is a time for selfexamination: what are the things that make us more aware of God's presence? What are the things that help us to love our neighbors more fully? And in contrast: What are the habits or feelings that isolate us? What are the things that divide us? These are some of the questions I am asking going into this season.

Many people mark the season of Lent by making a change through either giving something up or adding something. I think that Lent is the perfect time to try a new spiritual practice — you can even try a different one every week! Here are some of my favorite options:

- Lectio Divina: An ancient practice of praying and meditating with the scriptures.
- **Examen Prayer**: This classical prayer model is adapted from Ignatius of Loyola as a way to reflect on how God is present throughout our day-to-day life.
- **Prayer Journal**: Try writing down your prayers instead of thinking them or saying them aloud.

Regardless of your Lenten practices, I hope this season brings new reminders of God's unending love for you and for all of creation as we move towards spring, warmer weather, and a season of new birth.

Women's Basketball NCAA Fundraiser 2025



The annual NCAA basketball tournament is back!

We will be following the WOMEN'S Bracket for our fundraiser again this year.

Selection happens on Sunday, March 16. Are you feeling lucky? Local and regional charities hope so! We will hold the church pool again this year. There will be a \$5 entry fee, and the winner will choose which charity will receive the pool monies. If you do not want to fill out a bracket and would like to contribute to the pool, that is OK too! Last year, Kayleigh Medhurst won and was able to give the \$165 pool to Project Heal. So far, we have given away a total of over \$2,000 through this annual charity!

To enter, simply fill out a bracket and turn it in to the church office between Sunday, March 16, and 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 20, with the \$5 entry fee. You should also note your chosen charity when you turn in the bracket. Brackets will be available in the church office or you can print your own. Please either include cash or a check payable to Grace Lutheran Church with NCAA in the memo field. You could also scan your bracket and send it to mike@gracedm.org.

With no clear favorite to win this year, we will again use a scoring system with added points for the First Round upsets to keep things exciting. The "First Four" games will not be included. Those who correctly predict a First Four team winning in the First Round will get the point no matter which wins in the First Four. The round of 64 teams will be worth 1 point each with bonus points for upsets (difference between seeds). Round of 32 will be worth 2 points, round of 16 will be worth 4 points each. The following rounds will be worth 6 points, 10 points, and then 15 points for the correct Champion.

March Little Free Pantry Request of the Month:

We are all looking forward to some warmer weather as spring is around the corner. How about a little "spring cleaning" in your kitchen? Do you have any shelf-stable food items that you bought to make a recipe that you probably won't make now? Or perhaps you bought extra canned food that was on sale?

This month, we will collect any items you would like to donate for the Little Free Pantry, even if the "best buy" has expired. Most of these items are still safe to consume. Below are some guidelines. Food may be safely eaten **past the "best by" date** as follows:

6 months	Rice mixes
9 months	Pancake mix
12 months	Cereal, oatmeal, boxed meals, brown rice, dried beans
18 months	Peanut butter, acidic canned foods (tomatoes, pineapple)
2 years	White rice
3 years	Canned meats, canned beans, pasta
5 years	Canned soup and vegetables

Sunday and Ash Wednesday Text Summaries

If you are someone who likes to ponder the texts in advance, or if you are signed up to lector in the coming month, we've provided a short summary of each week's readings as well as the specific verses. March 2 was listed in the February issue of this newsletter, also found on our website..

Ash Wednesday Luke 9:51-62 (Jesus sets out for Jerusalem) The "would-be followers" (as the NRSVUE calls them) have good intentions. They want to follow Jesus, but Jesus calls them to put their money where their mouths are. Somewhere between good intentions and impulsive action lies discipleship. On Ash Wednesday, we make a commitment to align our intentions and our actions.

March 9 Luke 10:25-37 (Parable of the Good Samaritan) This parable begins and ends with the question, "Who is my neighbor?" and the answer is, surprisingly, "the stranger." The Samaritan, whose place of worship and customs are different from the scribe who questions Jesus, is both a stranger and a neighbor to the man who was beaten and left in a ditch. In our world, many of our physical neighbors are strangers to us, and many of our neighbors—those closest to us—feel like strangers in divisive political climates. If we align our intentions and actions, then maybe we need to reconsider who we consider "stranger," and ask ourselves if we have acted as good neighbors.

March 16 Luke 10:38-42 (Mary & Martha host Jesus) In many translations, Jesus says that "Mary has chosen the better part," which has been used to create a divide between Mary and Martha. However, in the Greek, Mary has chosen the "good portion," and Martha's tasks are called "ministry." Therefore, perhaps Mary represents our faith, our desire to know God intimately, and Martha represents our good works, our desire to transform the world. Both are needed, and both are good.

March 23 Luke 13:6-9 (Parable of the fig tree) The gardener in the vineyard knows the fig tree needs rest, nutrients, and time—and it also needs to produce fruit. Both things are true, which is also true for us. If we are always striving for more growth without taking time to rest, we will burn out. But if we are only ever resting, we won't bear fruit or grow. The fig tree also teaches us that the in between time—of nurture before fruit—can be where transformation begins.

March 30 Luke 15:1-7 (Parable of the Lost Sheep) Herding sheep is a never-ending task. As soon as one is found, another may go missing. Our lives have a similar ebb and flow—in one moment we might feel like we have it all together, and in the next, we're struggling to survive. The promise of this parable is that no matter how "lost" we feel, the Good shepherd is by our side.

Finding God in Nature

When we are asked where we find God, many of us would say that we find God in nature, which was mentioned in last month's article. There are inherent soul connections we humans have with nature and relationship is where the holy dwells. This excerpt from Fyodor Dostoevsky, *The Brothers Karamazov*, explains beautifully how we are to love all God's creation:



Love all God's creation, the whole and every grain of sand in it. Love every leaf, Every ray of light. Love the animals, love the plants, love everything. If you love everything, you will perceive the divine mystery in things... When you are left alone, pray. Love to throw yourself on the earth and kiss it. Kiss the earth and love it with an unceasing, consuming love.

The words in Matthew 6:28: "Consider the lilies of the field ..." can be taken literally. Take a good look at the grass, the flowers, the birds. "Just listen – to the sound of the river or the waterfall or the rain ... Listen and do nothing else but listen. And in doing this you become one with the object: you identify with it; you lose your small self and discover your true self." *Christian Zen,* p 126

"Closeness to nature helps most people pray – and helps them substantially. People have their preferences, of course: the seashore with the sound of the waves beating against the sane, or a quietly flowing river, or the stillness and beautiful surroundings of a lake, or the peace of a mountaintop ... Jesus knew that the place in which we pray has an influence on the quality of our prayer." He suggests exposing "ourselves long and lovingly to places that help us to pray whenever we get the chance. Take time out to gaze at and drink in the atmosphere of the starry or moonlight night or the seashore or the mountaintop. You can then carry this around with you in your heart ..." Anthony De Mello, in *Sadhana A Way to God*, at p. 69.

One Scottish prayer that reflects the love of nature and the peace that comes through it is the following:

Deep peace of the running wave to you, Deep peace of the flowing air to you, Deep peace of the quiet earth to you, Deep peace of the shining stars to you, Deep peace of the son of peace to you.

We come to God by connecting to what is – with God's immediate, embodied presence which is all around us. And when we make that connection, we experience deep peace.

February Congregational Council Meeting Highlights

Recap: The February 2 All-Ages Service Project held to benefit the Urban Bicycle Food Ministry

Pam Hellman Palmer, who has volunteered with the UBFM for more than 8 years, spoke to us about the work that UBFM does, while Grace members wrote personal notes and assembled 100 Blessing Bags for the group to distribute. Grace members also donated the following items, which were very much needed during the recent extreme cold: 19 water bottles, 20 blankets, 7 pairs of boots, 22 coats, 12 jackets/sweatshirts, 12 pants, 24 hats, 7 scarves, 32 pairs of gloves, 23 toiletry items, 1 flashlight, and 9 pairs handwarmers.

The group started 10 years ago with one person delivering 20 burritos on their bike. They now average 45 to 50 volunteers, delivering 800 burritos and 700 sandwiches to more than 450 people each week in the DM metro area either on bikes or in cars depending on the route and time of year.

Finance Report – January 2025 Results

Financial results for January YTD are as follows:

- Income Actual \$29,022, Budget \$34,804, Prior year \$37,696
- Expenses Actual \$39,130, Budget \$42,125, Prior year \$41,099
- Net activity Actual (\$10,108), Budget (\$7,321), Prior year (\$3,403)



After a strong finish in 2024, activity for January was slightly behind budget due to lower pledged offering activity. The committee appreciates the congregation's interest in the financial status of the church as evidenced by attendance at the recent budget forum and annual meeting.

Worship Volunteer Needs:

Each week we are need of a Greeter, Lector, Communion Assistant, and Coffee/Donut Server. During Lent we will need additional help on Ash Wednesday, Lenten Wednesday Evening Worship, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday.
