Confession and Forgiveness

L: Friends, we are truthtellers in the prayer of confession. We are honest about the fact that we are works in progress. We tell the truth of our lives. We lay it all out before God. But this moment of prayer isn't just about us. In the prayer of confession we also reveal who God is, and our God is merciful. Our God is slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. So let us pray, knowing that God's truth will always mean grace for us.

Processional Hymn Palm Sunday is the day in Lent when we first begin to hear the story of the Passion of Jesus. That long ago day, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young horse or donkey, thus fulfilling the Old Testament prophesy. Crowds of pilgrims were aathered to celebrate Jesus' arrival, and they waved palm branches and threw them at his feet as he passed. They also chanted "Hosanna", which can be literally translated as "deliver us." The events of Holy Week and the Resurrection followed this triumphal procession. We remember and observe Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem by waving palm branches as the cross processes to the altar. Please remain in your pew, but wave your palm branch high in the air as we sing the processional hymn together.

C: when I shout out, but do not shout your name, when I listen, but do not listen for your voice. Forgive me.

L: Create in me a heart like yours.

C: Amen.

L: Friends, whether or not you stuck to your Lenten goals this year, whether or not this is your first time in church or your thousandth time, whether or not you know to speak to God or listen for God's voice, God listens to you. God is merciful. God is abounding in steadfast love. There is nothing you could do or leave undone that could keep God from loving you. So hear and believe the good news of the gospel:

C: We are seen. We are heard. We are loved. We are forgiven. Not a day goes by that we ever walk alone. Hosanna in the highest! Amen.






Reading Notes:

Jesus doesn't instigate his own parade. Instead, just his quiet presence alone inspires the multitude to shout out and praise God. When the religious leaders try to silence the crowd, Jesus tells them that the noise level isn't the point—even the stones would cry out if they were silent. It takes wisdom to know when our voice is needed and when it's just noise.

Reading: Luke 19:29-40

²⁹When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. 31If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" 32So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. 33As they were untvind the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" 34They said, "The Lord needs it." 35Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. ³⁷As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, 38 saying, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" 39 Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him. "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." 40He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."


