Life Lessons

In his commencement speech for the University of Western Australia on September 17th, 2013, comedian Tim Minchin spoke of "9 Life Lessons." During his portion about Lesson 5. Be Hard on Your Opinions, he stated the following:

"We must think critically, and not just about the ideas of others. Be hard on your beliefs. Take them out onto the verandah and beat them with a cricket bat. Be intellectually rigorous. Identify your biases, your prejudices, your privilege. Most of society's arguments are kept alive by a failure to acknowledge nuance. We tend to generate false dichotomies, then try to argue one point using two entirely different sets of assumptions, like two tennis players trying to win a match by hitting beautifully executed shots from either end of separate tennis courts."

I had never heard of Tim Minchin before seeing a portion of this speech. As I look at the arguments happening in our society these days, his words ring true. There seems to be an unwillingness to put our beliefs to the test. There seems to be a fear that if we start to examine things too closely, it will be seen as weakness. So, people keep reciting the same things in the hopes that it wins the point. The truth is that they are hitting beautifully crafted shots on different tennis courts.

We followers of Christ are called to a different point of view. We are reminded to look at the "log in our own eye" before criticizing the speck in another's eye, or that only those without sin can cast the first stone. We are called to reconciliation and the work of building, or re-building, community. This is not easy work, but it is extremely important work.

Siblings in Christ, don't take the bait. Don't dive into abusive rhetoric. Don't demonize those who may think differently than you.

Why I felt called to be on the committee:

At the age of five, I tried on my sister's dress. It felt right, but I knew I had to keep it to myself. In 1950's America, this was considered crazy and just not done. When I reached adolescence, I started shoplifting items of girls' clothing and felt ashamed. Later, I bought things and hid them in my room. Before I married my wife, I told her about me but said I could stop.

I don't know for sure, but my denial and anxiety probably contributed to my alcoholism. I drank for almost twenty years. My last drink was on April 8, 1995. I have been a member of AA for more than thirty years now.

Over the years, my wife and I have struggled to accept my authentic self. Since 2023, I have progressed to coming out as Amy to people in my life. Most people have been good about it. When I came out at Grace, I felt embraced in love. I think it would be good if other people like me, who fall into the LGBTQIA group, could feel the warmth that I did, from members of our church. My pronouns are she and her.

Meets with other middle schoolers on Wednesday evenings, with occasional service projects through the year. Wednesdays, 6:45 p.m. in room 102.


Weekday Bible Study with a Focus on Exodus

Prayer Journaling by Pam Palmer

Dear Diary... it's what instantly comes to mind when I think of Prayer Journaling. As a young girl, I longed for a diary for my birthday. My first one had a pink and white gingham cover with a pretty gold tone lock and key. Oh, the secrets and heart-felt emotions I shared! Prayer journaling really isn't any different if you think about it. Instead of "Dear Diary", it's "Dear God".

Why journal? Why not? Journaling helps me feel closer to God. By taking the time to write down my prayer requests and thanking Him for my many blessings, I can also see how He's working in my life over time. He wants and longs to hear from me—from the joy in seeing a sunset to the lament in finding a new job to the reflection while reading a Bible verse. Journaling also helps record the details of my prayer experience. Lord knows how easy it is to forget the little things! Even in the tough times, documenting and reflecting on the specifics of my prayers keeps me moving towards God.

A fancy bound book isn't required for prayer journaling (unless you want one). Anything can work—a spiral bound notebook, scrap paper in a 3-ring binder. Nor do all of your journals need to match. Black or red ink. Scribbled penmanship or neat block letters. Use stickers or draw if you want. God doesn't mind.

I don't write in my journal every day nor at the same time of day. It's a habit I need to work on. I've noticed the more I do write in it, however, the better focused I tend to be throughout my week. I feel more calm and ready to tackle whatever lies ahead. My best suggestion is to keep it in a place where you'll see it and USE it—on a nightstand, on the kitchen counter, in the car before you head into work or wait in the pick-up line at school.

Some days I fill a couple pages. Other days, I can only muster a sentence or two. No matter how much time is spent, writing helps "get out" whatever is on my mind, laying it at His feet. Writing also helps me to stop and focus on God, taking the time to truly pray. My mind can easily wander otherwise—worrying about a leaky faucet or what to add to the grocery list. I always try to mention something I'm thankful for too. Find one thing, anything to be grateful each time you write.

Much like the diary I used to have, God is a trusted confidente, always available with a listening ear. I can share ANYTHING with Him—the good, the bad, the ugly. He doesn't care how much I've written, how often or whether my grammar is perfect. God meets me wherever I am, just as I am. Every. Single. Time. Now go find some paper and write!

Ronald McDonald House Charities collects pop tabs from cans (soda, soup, pet food, etc.) to raise money for programs that support sick children. The collected tabs are taken to a recycling

enter where they are weighed and sold for their aluminum value. It takes approximately 1000 tabs to equal a pound. 1 pound sells for approximately 50 cents. That doesn't sound like much *unless* many participate.

Joie Gronert delivers the baggies to the Ronald McDonald House when nearby - just leave your bags of pop can tabs by the sink near the pop machine at Grace and she'll pick them up.

A Look at Little Free Pantries - written by Kari Dostalik

Little Free Pantries (LFP) – a mainstay in neighborhoods across the Des Moines metro, the state of Iowa, the United States and beyond – provide a grassroots solution to local food insecurity needs.

Jessica McClard launched the grassroots mini pantry movement in May 2016 in Fayetteville, AR, when she planted the *Little Free Pantry Pilot*, a wooden box on a post containing food, personal care, and paper items accessible to everyone all the time, no questions asked. She hoped her spin on the Little Free Library® concept would pique local awareness of food insecurity while creating a space for neighbors to help meet neighborhood food needs. In just three months, the movement had gone global.

How do LFP differ from other food pantries?

- LFP are small, limiting the quantity and variety of items on hand. While brick-and-mortar food pantries
 are better at meeting pervasive needs, sometimes things may fall through the cracks. LFP are a safety
 net. For example, many brick-and-mortar food pantries require an application and most have hours of
 operation. Anyone may access LFP at any time.
- Additionally, brick-and-mortar food pantries are considered service providers, and those who use them, "clients." LFP help dissolve that professional boundary. Whether giving or taking, everyone approaches LFP the same way, mediating the shame that sometimes accompanies need.
- Ultimately, LFP are a centrally located reminder of our neighbors' need that creates a neighborhood space for exercising compassion, trust, and mutual aid.

Who are LFP for?

LFP are for those who want to give. LFP are for those not easily able to meet everyday food and personal needs. LFP are for a hungry kid after school or a home cook who forgot to buy an onion. LFP are for **everyone**.

Need for LFP in Iowa

According to Feeding America's annual "Map the Meal Gap" study (May 2025), food insecurity in Iowa remains a significant problem, with 12% of Iowans (1 in 8) and 16.6% of Iowa children (1 in 6) facing food insecurity. This means that 385,130 Iowans (including 120,220 children) do not know where they will find their next meal.

All 99 lowa counties saw an increase in food insecurity in the latest report. Polk County's overall food insecurity rate is 11.5%. Among children, it's 16%. The 56,970 people affected by hunger in Polk County (including nearly 20,000 children) comprise nearly 15% of the state's overall food insecure population.

In 2021, the Kids Count Data Center reported that 41.8% of lowa students were eligible for free or reduced-price lunch. Des Moines Public Schools reported 75.1% of its students were eligible for free or reduced-price lunch during the 2024-25 school year.

Food pantries continue to experience record-breaking demand, with thousands more people seeking assistance than the previous year. Contributing factors include:

- **Decline in Federal Aid:** The discontinuation of pandemic-era programs, like the Child Tax Credit and summer EBT, has put more strain on food-insecure families.
- **Increased Demand on Food Pantries:** The Des Moines Area Religious Council (DMARC) provided food to over 70,000 people in 2024, a significant increase from the previous year.
- **Demographics of Need:** Food pantries are now seeing a high demand from working adults and disabled individuals, not just the unemployed.

Grace's Little Free Pantry

In 2019, Grace Lutheran Church established its Little Free Pantry, located outside on 52nd Street near the garden, to help meet growing food insecurity in our neighborhood. Today, the LFP Team at Grace stocks the Little Free Pantry with approximately 50 items eight times a week. We maintain this service to the community thanks to donations, which include money, food, and personal care items.

Each month, an average of \$700 is spent to restock the backstock room with toilet paper, soap, and feminine products, in addition to shelf-stable food. This translates to 500-600 packaged items a month, some of which are multi-pack items that can be distributed individually, such as Ramen noodles, oatmeal, bar soap, etc.

Fill the Pantry Event

Thanks to everyone who made the "God's Work. Our Hands." Fill the Pantry event a success! Members worked together to bag more than 1,500 items for 21 pantries throughout the Des Moines metro (see locations below). Five teams then traveled across the metro to stock each pantry with 74 food/personal care items (including Grace's Little Free Pantry). Photos of the event can be found on the next page.

Finance Report - August Results

Financial results for August YTD are as follows:

- Income Actual \$269,805, Budget \$291,383, Prior Year \$287,730
- Expenses Actual \$283,655, Budget \$292,225, Prior Year \$296,071
- Net activity Actual (\$13,850), Budget (\$842), Prior Year (\$8,341)



Activity was \$13,008 below budget compared to \$4,411 below budget last month.

The variance is primarily due to lower pledged offering than budgeted. Lack of Vicar and Property Manager positions during the summer caused expenses to be below budget.

During the year significant expense has occurred for repairs of the boiler and the elevator. Additionally, Capital Campaign monies were used to fund \$11,200 for gutter replacement and \$42,400 for tuck pointing of brickwork.
