## The Good, the Bad, and the Bible

We live in an increasingly divided world. It used to be only the individuals on the extremes that would point their finger at the other side. We have become far more polarized and continue to move toward the ends of the political spectrum. Each side claiming the “Good” title while declaring the other side “Bad.” Both sides quote the Bible. What does the Bible really say?

There are three major themes in the Bible that feel important right now. The first is that we are to care for the marginalized. This is a theme throughout the Bible. This is not just a teaching of Jesus. It is a central command in the Old Testament. We are to care for the widow, the orphan, the poor, the leper, the foreigner, anyone who is in need. The Bible, in multiple places, states that abuse of the foreigner among you is abuse toward God.

These commands to care for the marginalized and oppressed is not only a social concern. The Old Testament links this directly with our relationship with God. How we treat the “other” is how we view God. That is a humbling truth.

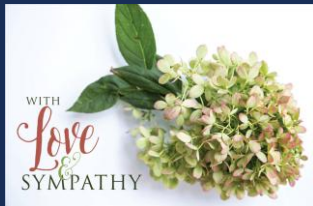
The second is that we are not to curse our leaders. There are times when we do not agree with the decisions that leaders make, and that is on both sides of the aisle. The Bible is very clear that to cross the line toward curse or wishing ill will on someone is also a direct violation of other and of God. God loves the world, the cosmos. To wish ill will on anyone is to detract from their fullness. This should never mean we stand by idly and watch. We are to claim our voice and stand up for others. We are also driven toward our neighbor and the “other.” We should look out for one another while holding leaders accountable.

This brings me to the third theme I would like to highlight. God continues to hold God's people accountable. Not even King David was above accountability. For justice to work, it has to be for all. There is often the illusion that God's chosen people (however you define that) can take whatever they want because they are, well, God's chosen. That is not the story the Bible tells. The Bible is filled with examples where God holds leaders accountable. God holds the people accountable. God loves you. That does not mean God loves someone else less. If you have to put someone else down to feel better about your relationship with God, it is time to read or re-read the Bible.

Friends, these are tough times. The world is filled with uncertainty and finger pointing. May we stay rooted in the Bible and connected with one another.

### Vicars Voice

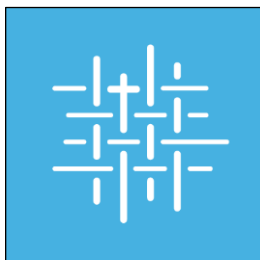

To date, thirty-one pledges and cash gifts have been received totaling \$481,607. These gifts will be received over five years with over 95% being realized in the next three years. **The Welcome Statement** proposed and shared by TeamGRACE was voted on at the Grace Annual Member meeting this past Sunday, January 25. One amendment to add "and nationality" was suggested and approved by those attending. The statement as it reads below was voted on and accepted.

*"Grace Lutheran Church commits to welcoming and celebrating all people; those in the LGBTQIA+ community, Black, Indigenous, People of Color, and their allies.*

*We commit to the work of anti-racism, liberation, social and environmental justice for all of God's creation. We affirm the sacredness of all people, regardless of sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression. We affirm the sacredness of all those who have experienced exclusion because of race, ability, age, culture, or nationality. We affirm the sacredness of those who wrestle with addiction, physical or mental health, imprisonment, socio-economic circumstances, or anything that too often divides us.*

*No matter the labels others may place upon you, or the labels you may place upon yourself, here at Grace you will find a home among friends in need of a Savior. You are welcome here."*



### **Fat Tuesday Celebration Party!**

The last task of becoming a Reconciling in Christ Church is to celebrate completion of the process and commitment to become a fully welcoming community.

***You are invited to attend a celebration party at Grace Lutheran Church, 5201 Urbandale Avenue, Des Moines, IA. Our theme is Mardi Gras and we will have snacks, a King cake, music, and fun.***

**Tuesday, February 17, 6 -ish Grace Hall.**

**Exact time to be announced - watch the weekly announcements and the website calendar.**

Traditionally, people used up fats and meat to prepare for the time of Lent, when sacrifices were made to mark the life and death of Jesus in the Christian church. Mardi Gras translates to Fat Tuesday in English. It celebrates life and abundance. Other names and traditions focus more on purifying oneself and offering penance, such as Shrove Tuesday. The tradition of Pancake Tuesday evolved from those looking for ways to use up egg and dairy items prior to the beginning of Lent. These are just a few of the traditions connect to this holiday season, beginning January 6 to and continuing through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday.

Carnelvarium (or carnival ) means "taking away meat", which is part of the Lenton sacrifice; fish often takes the place of meat during the forty day period.

Three colors remind us of Mardi Gras: purple represents justice; green represents faith; gold represents power. King cake is eaten only at this time, to celebrate the birth of the King, Jesus. We are called to welcome people in justice and faith, using our power to show hospitality to all people. Join us for some King Cake in the Louisiana tradition of celebration.

Several members requested Bible verses to support acceptance of LGBTQ+. We will be sharing information from Biblical scholars in the coming months. Some laws in ancient times were cultural as opposed to spiritual, such as do not eat pork and wash before entering the Temple. Some laws change over time, but some are clearly the foundation of these laws.

Old Testament: Micah 6:8

*He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?*

New Testament: Mark 12: 28-31

*One of the scribes came near and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, he asked him, "Which commandment is the first of all?" Jesus answered, "The first is 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord our God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these."*

The message is clear: love God and love others; those actions are primary. It does not say make a judgment about who is worthy.

## Ways to Pray by Cindy Mackey

From childhood we all learn ways to pray, which includes intercessory prayer, prayers of gratitude, and rote prayers such as the Lord's Prayer when we can't find our own words. In prior columns in the Friendly

Visitor, we have written about Contemplative prayer practices such as walking meditation, Lectio Divina, Centering Prayer, walking the Labyrinth, sacred gazing, and more.

I believe that God speaks to us where we are, and because God already knows our needs and desires, our best prayer often begins with awe. I find that awe always leads me to gratitude. In the words of Benedictine Abbot John Chapman, what is important is "to pray as we can, not as we can't". I find that the way I can pray changes daily.

It is often through the door of our ordinary experience that we are brought face to face with the Divine. Where else would God be but right here? Believing that God speaks through the circumstances and people in my life, it is critical that I slow myself down and give my attention to what is here and now. In the Ignatian Spirituality tradition this is identified as taking "a long loving look at the real".

We respond most completely through awareness in our three centers; heart, body, and head. Admittedly my head sometimes gets in the way! To reveal God's truth without words, without interpretation or analysis I often find the practice of Visio Divina very helpful. This is prayer inspired by a sacred image. It is experiential and sensory. You could say that the Holy Spirit prays in and through my very human response to the image. It is a type of sacred gazing.

To experience Visio Divina, I invite you to sit in stillness with Daniel Bonnell's image called "The Baptism of the Christ". You can search for this image online at [fineartamerica.com](http://fineartamerica.com). Or, you may choose an image that you have more readily available if you cannot be online.

## Spiritual Direction Offer

Spiritual Direction is one way to help you begin to find a path through some of the difficult moments we find ourselves in. Members of Grace can meet with Deb Richards free of charge, as the Being New Spirituality Center has received a generous donation for the cost of your initial sessions. It's a conversation much like the others that take place in our everyday lives, but with more intention. And greater **attention**. It's a chance to explore what you truly think and feel, in a safe, non-judgmental space.

Meeting in the company of a trained spiritual director supports our sense of well-being, and is a place to ask real questions, and make meaning of our experiences.

- Once you have the [Bulletins](#) page open, locate the date of the worship you are looking for. You can now open any of the bulleted links related to that date. You may read these online, download to your device, or print as you wish.
